Battery "E" Does Well Armory Is Inadequate

While no official report on the annual inspection of Battery "E" will be received for at least two months, Lieutenant-Colonel J. L. Long, who inspected the battery Wednesday night, expressed himself as well pleased with the drill and appearance of the outfit and that, considering armory and drill facilities, the unit made a very good showing. Colonel Long was unfavorably impressed with the armory and, like other inspecting officers, believes it does not offer sufficient protection for United States property nor adequate drill facilities.

The battery made a creditable appearance in infantry drill, guard mounting, first aid demonstration, sanitation, signalling by wigwagging, military courtesy and artillery drill. The outfit successfully passed all tests.

The inspecting officer expressed himself as pleased with the appearance of the battery, the members being dressed in the regulation uniform with white shirts and black ties.

An inspection of the administrative department was held in the afternoon and all reports were found to be in first class condition.

Colonel Long and Major C. W. Waller left today for Marshfield, where they will inspect the units in that district.

Battery "E" will start outdoor target practice Sunday at its new range south of the city.

Shall Relief Work Be Completed or Half Done

Shall we leave the job half done, or shall we go to the end in saving 132,000 children, 100,000 of whom already have been saved? This was the question asked by L. B. Handsaker of Portland, director of near east relief in Oregon, in addresses before the high school student body and at the noon luncheon of the Lions club today.

The question was asked as a reply to those who wish to know when this work will cease, these questions coming from those giving relief funds, from those benefiting by the relief funds and by the governments where near east orphans are being cared for.
