Snow Expensive for Portland. PORTLAND, March 8.—(UP)—Portland's only snowfall last year cost the city \$38,455, according to a report filed by George A. Ries, superintendent of the street cleaning department.

Delving further into statistics, it was discovered that the city employed 3540 men and 850 trucks to haul away 96,000 cubic yards of snow covering 325 city blocks and 329 intersections. In addition, 248 blocks were plowed to keep them open to traffic.

An interesting specimen of slime mold or myxozoa has been found by Llewellyn Rex of the botany class. Slime molds are found in damp places and in warm weather they spread over moist surfaces and creep through cracks and rotting bark. Scientists have disagreed as to whether this fungus like growth is a plant or an animal. In the early stage it moves over the bark or object upon which it is growing until the slender stalk grows and forms a ball at the end having many spores. This slime mold occurs in large colonies on barkless, decaying logs.
