rels (Citellus douglasii) are noxious re-
sidents in Lane county, Oregon,
Now, therefore, all of such persons,
firms, copartnerships, corporations and
companies owning or having dominion
over land in said Lane county, Oregon,
are hereby notified to take steps to ex-
terminate said gray digger ground squir-
rels (Citellus douglasii) within 30 days
from the date of the first publication of
this notice. If such steps are not taken,
a person or persons appointed by the
county court of said Lane county, will
enter upon said lands and proceed to ex-
terminate said gray digger ground squir-
rels (Citellus douglasii) and the cost of
said extermination will be levied against
said lands.
The county agricultural agent hereby
designates Monday, April 2nd, as the day
to be known as "squirrel poisoning day",
throughout the said Lane county, and
is hereby notifying that person or per-
sons, as prepared by the undersigned
and representatives of the bureau of
biological survey of the United States
department of agriculture, he used for
the purpose of such extermination. Such
poisoned barley may be secured from the
undersigned at his office in Eugene, Lane
county, Oregon, at approximately the cost
of preparation.

Mania for Gambling
Decreases in China

Gambling is the dominating na-
tional passion of China, and every
Chinese indulges in it, whatever
his age, social position, or fortune.
He bets on everything—the number
of seeds in an orange, the number
of persons who will pass by a given
point in a given time.
In five minutes the coolie will
lose all the money he has saved in a
month. The petty employee will do
the same with his salary and the
banker with his fortune. The
Chinese gambles at all times and
places—during his meals, at the
theater, between the acts, in trains,
and in offices.

Under the empire the favorite
form of gambling took a singular
shape. It was as if every one in
France bet on the most successful
candidates entering our big schools
of learning. All China would par-
ticipate in these enormous wagers.
In all prefectures and subprefec-
tures the names of the competing
candidates were announced, and as
soon as the results were known
extra rapid couriers carried the
names to all parts of the empire.
Nowadays the people limit them-
selves to betting on who will be
chosen ministerial functionaries,
and the game does not enjoy the
vogue it once did.—George A. May-

Ambergris in Demand
for Use in Perfumes

When you tramp the margin of
the sea, along the line where the
waves leave seaweed, bottle corks,
and the unconsidered fishman and
jetman which come out to take
away, make sure that the piece of
stuff you took to be mottled soap
is not a lump of ambergris. This
precious substance, of which whale-
men dream in their ambitious wan-
derings about the Seven seas, comes
from the alimentary canal of the
sperm whale or cachalot.

A few years ago Norwegians fish-
ing in Australian waters found in
one whale ambergris weighing ap-
proximately 900 pounds. It was
worth \$135,000. By contrast, the
whole production of the United
States in 1922 only amounted to 44
pounds, worth about \$11,500. And
not so long ago a piece of good luck
befell a Spanish ship, the crew of
which found 248 pounds in an At-
lantic whale.

In centuries forgotten, when
sperm whales were more abundant,
ambergris did service in sacra-
mental rites. The Chinese admin-
ister it medicinally. But most that
is found today finds its way to per-
fumers, who use it as a fixative for
delicious scents.

Old Water Power Site

The first water power on this con-
tinent, it is said, was built on the
Piscataqua river at South Ber-
wick, Maine, on the site of the pre-
sent Burleigh blanket mills. It was
in 1629 that Ferdinand Gorges ob-
tained a grant from the English
crown giving him the right to set-
tle and develop the territory from
sea to sea lying between the forti-
eth and forty-eighth parallel north
latitude.

The grant, however, required him
to develop water power, and ac-
cordingly he constructed a log
dam, erected a grist mill and sent
the meal to England as proof that
the terms of the contract were be-
ing respected. The water power
site has been in continuous use
ever since and has lately come into
public notice when the property
changed hands.

Industrial By-Products

A list of the principal by-prod-
ucts of the packing industry in-
cludes all kinds of leather, artifi-
cial teeth, beef extract, buttons,
candles, canned edible products
formerly wasted, combs, crochet
needles, dice, drum snares, fertil-
izer, gelatin, glue, glycerin, hair
for brushes, handles for knives,
handles for razors, hair for uphol-
stering, hairpins, imitation stag
horn, inedible grease, laundry
soaps, musical strings, napkin rings,
nestsfoot oil, nursing rings, oleo-
margarine, pancreatin, pepsin, per-
fume, pipestems, rennet, stock
feeds, supparenal—worth more
than \$4,000 a pound; tennis strings,
thyroid tablets, toilet soaps, um-
brella handles, wool.

Utilizing the Beauty
of Ancient Paneling

Paneling in Tudor days was a
necessity, not a luxury, and there
was continual activity in the build-
ing line, says an article in Arts
and Decoration Magazine. In many
instances the changes and altera-
tions are, closely associated with
the history of the family who were
the owners of the building.

At the time of Henry VII the in-
terior of many of the famous
houses throughout the land was
much changed and there seemed a
greater desire for smaller and
more private rooms. The great hall
usually contained the finest exam-
ples of wood carving, but in Eliza-
bethan times the long gallery and
smaller rooms succeeded it and the
beauty of the paneling was fre-
quently hidden by richly colored
and magnificent tapestries.

Much of this fine work has with-
stood the wear and tear of cen-
turies by pure accident, in many
cases being covered by thick coats
of plaster which has seemed to an

than the somber wall covering. The
clever antique dealer of today
takes a portion from one house,

Birds Public Benefactors

Contrary to popular opinion, says
the biological survey, various birds
eat even the hairy types of cater-
pillars, like those of the cossock
gypsy and brown tail moths, and
the tent caterpillars. That bureau
has found 45 species of birds which
feed extensively on the alfalfa
weevil, while 60 attack the cotton-
boll weevil. Orioles will pick
weevils out of the squares of flower
buds of the cotton, while swallows
feed on them while in flight and ex-
tending their range. Mallard ducks
have been effectively used in ponds
for mosquito control. Red-eyed
vireos seem to be attracted by fall
webworms, while cutworms form a
large part of the diet of starlings,
crows and jackdaws. Blackbirds
help to keep down the number of
boll worms and many other pests.
Sparrows and other birds have
been observed to clean up infesta-
tions of termites. Birds should be
regarded as an ever-present force
that should be kept at a maximum
efficiency by protective measures so
that their service may be utilized
whenever possible.

Hoss to Make Plunge
For Secretary of State

Resigns Public Positions in
Order to Be Free to Pro-
mote His Candidacy.

OREGON, CITY, Ore., March 21.
—Hal E. Hoss of Oregon City has
formally announced himself as a
candidate for the republican nomi-
nation as secretary of state, and
will have his name on the ballot
in the primary election May 18.
Mr. Hoss, who has been manager
of the Oregon City Enterprise and
later private secretary to Governor
Patterson, resigned his state posi-



tion a short time ago in order to
devote his time to his candidacy,
and his announcement comes as a
result of encouragement received
in a state-wide survey he has been
conducting.

Coincident with his announce-
ment as a candidate, Mr. Hoss sent
in his resignation as secretary of
the state editorial association to
President Robert W. Sawyer of
Bend, but will retain his other
press association connections. He
will formally file for the office
within the next few days.

In his statement Mr. Hoss says:
"In announcing my candidacy
for the republican nomination as
secretary of state, I do so with a
well founded conception of the
situation. Since my resignation as
private secretary to Governor Pat-
terson a few weeks ago I have
been enabled to devote sufficient
time to a state-wide survey to con-
vince me that there is good op-
portunity for my nomination. Re-
ports from every section of the
state indicate a strong support and,
while every candidate for office is
prone to construe everything to his
own favor, I was willing to give

up my position with Governor Pat-
terson and go into the race, confi-
dent that I was not misreading
the minds of the republican voters
throughout the state.

"During my career as a news-
paper editor and as an officer in
newspaper associations, I had op-
portunity to form a great many
contacts with business and civic
leaders, and during the past year
and a quarter at Salem I have be-
come acquainted with a number of
people prominent in the public and
official life of the state. My work
with the press of Oregon has put
me in a position where I am re-
ceiving the support of a great num-
ber of newspapers and their en-

dorsement is no small part of my
encouragement.

"I sincerely believe that I am
qualified by experience and train-
ing and the human attributes to be
secretary of state. My business ex-
perience has been along adminis-
trative lines and in public life I
have had the opportunity to, and
did, study the work of the board
of control and the office of the
secretary of state at close range.
I intend, if nominated and elected,
to give the people of Oregon an ef-
ficient and courteous administration
of their affairs, so far as they
would come under my jurisdiction.
I would enter the office of secre-
tary of state free from political

entanglements, owing no debt to
any individual or group. I am a
native citizen of the State of Ore-
gon, seeking one of its high offices
because I feel that I can do the
work well."

One Candidate Out, Another In.

David B. Evans of Eugene has
decided that he will not be a
candidate for the republican nomi-
nation for district attorney. Simul-
taneously, James E. King of the
same city announced that he would
seek the position.
