Teachers Are Named.

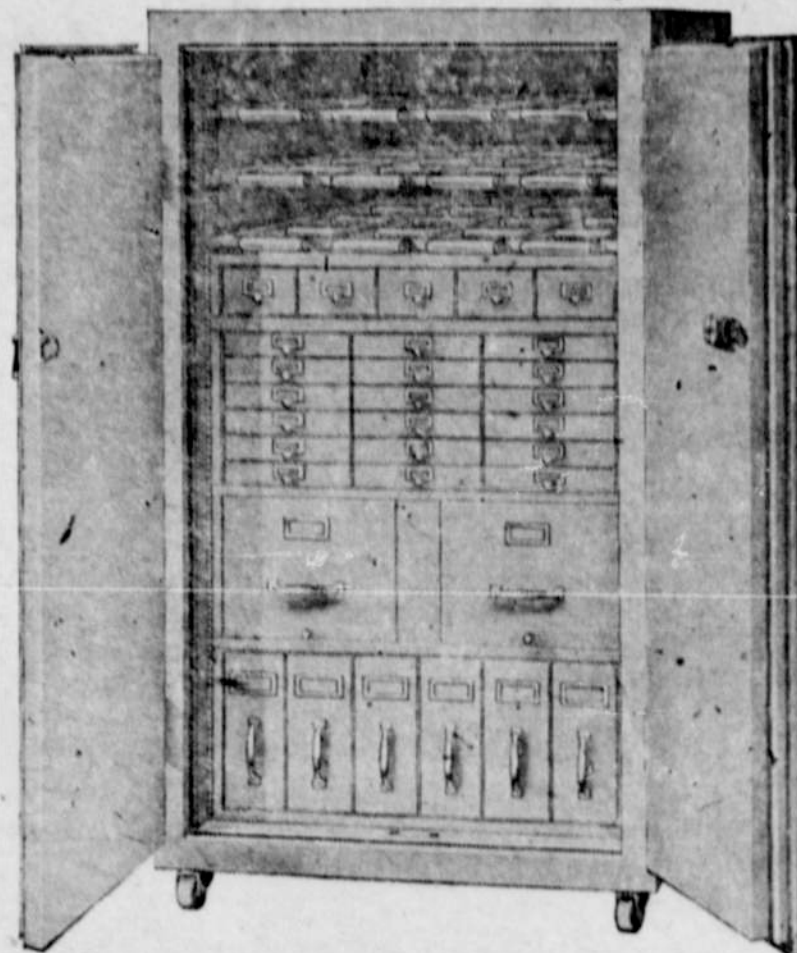
