



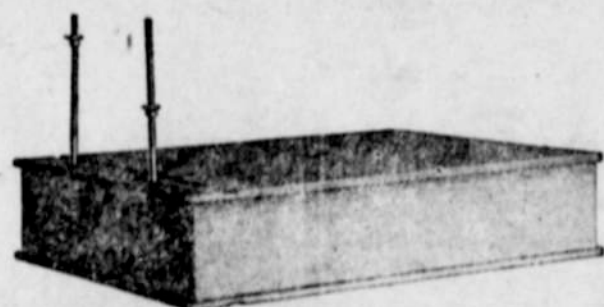

per here on dry ashes in the fall as soon as the ashes are cool. Mixtures for logged-off land should contain a good sod former and burr clover will have great value in the mixtures. Therefore, farmers should be sure that the bluegrass and red top seed are good, or increase the amount if they do not show excellent germination.

Pull sowing of pastures is usually considered best and early spring sowing, as in February or March, next best. Spring sowing is a little hazardous in the Willamette valley part of Lane county. Planting on a fairly firm seed bed with a little loose surface soil to allow the grass an opportunity to gain a foothold is very desirable. Clean weed-free spring grain stubble, or corn or potato land make good seed beds. Grass seed should not be planted deep, a light soil covering being best.

Various Gases

The bureau of standards says that water gas, usually enriched with oil, is the principal gas manufactured in the United States for city supply. Oil gas is a term used to designate a number of gases manufactured from oil. The differences between these various gases depend upon the relative proportions of the several constituents which make up the mixtures.

Gas Price Fluctuates

From 10c to 27c

A recent check by the American Automobile Association of the variance in gasoline prices over the United States shows that on November 22, 1927, the date the check was made, prices ranged from 10c a gallon on straight run gasoline at Peoria, Ill., to 27c for straight run at Phoenix, Ariz. High test gasoline cost 13c a gallon at Peoria and 29c a gallon at Phoenix. Between the low and high limits there were 47 different prices.

These figures included the gasoline tax in effect in the various states. It was shown, however, in the states where prices fluctuated widely from city to city that the tax was negligible as a factor.

Location of cities near sources of gasoline supply seemed to have no effect at all on prices as some of the highest prices were charged in cities adjacent to refineries.

Back Taxes Turned Over

Back taxes amounting to more than \$89,000 were turned over by Sheriff Taylor Tuesday to County Treasurer Schiska, having been collected for the years 1921 to 1926 inclusive. The amount for each year follows: 1921, \$127.59; 1922, \$279.35; 1923, \$295.41; 1924, \$2,714.88; 1925, \$9,362.85; 1926, \$72,503.53. Of the amount \$1292.50 was from sale of real property on tax foreclosures.
