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Belle Burkholder Rides On Stage With Suicide

Miss Belle Burkholder of Salem, who spent the week end with her mother, Mrs. Clara Burkholder, was a passenger on the south bound stage from which a man leaped into the Santiam river, committing suicide Saturday. Miss Burkholder said that she did not notice the man when she took the bus at Salem as the stage was crowded but other passengers told her after the tragedy that the man, who was from Couville, had avoided conversation on the way from Portland, where he boarded the stage. At Portland he had purchased a round trip ticket to Roseburg but when the driver gave back the return ticket the man tore it up. Just as the stage entered on the approach of the bridge over the Santiam near Jefferson the man became alert and in the center of the bridge knocked the glass out of a door with his arm and dove through. A passenger tried to catch the man but failed. The man landed on the bridge where he lay stunned a bare moment and then jumped into the river. The stage was stopped immediately and men of a nearby railroad track

crew were called upon to help but no trace of the man was found. Miss Burkholder said that the body did not come to the surface once after entering the river which was almost at flood stage. The stage was delayed an hour by the tragedy.
