The Delphian society will meet Monday night in the library and will study "Levantine Art and Church Architecture." Mrs. Ray Trask will be program leader.

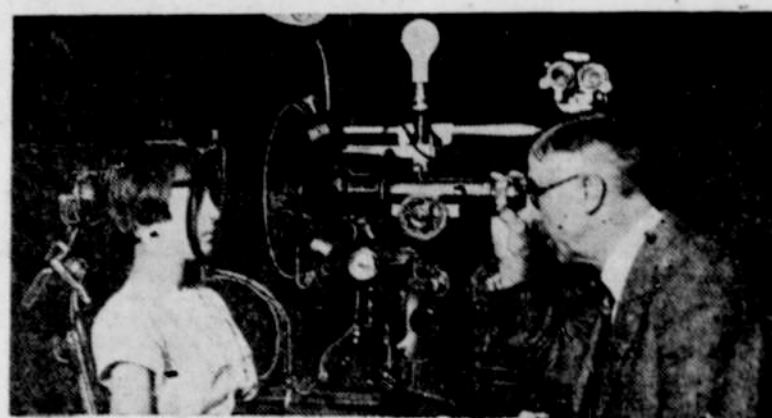
The women of the Baptist church will give a silver tea Wednesday afternoon, April 25, in the church parlors.

Survivor of Whitman Massacre Dies at 88

Mrs. Matilda Delaney Relative Local Woman, Known to Old Timers.

Mrs. Matilda Jane Sager Delaney, a survivor of the Whitman massacre and a former resident of Eugene, has died at Reseda, Cal., according to a telegram received by her daughter, Mrs. E. P. Dorris of Eugene. She was aged 88 years and six months.

Mrs. Delaney was born in Union Center, O., October 16, 1839. In 1844 her parents brought the family across the plains, both dying en route. The people of the wagon train brought the children, two boys and five girls, one a baby in arms, to the Whitman mission, where Dr. Marcus Whitman took charge of the orphaned children. He had applied for adoption papers prior to the massacre, which occurred in 1847. Mr. and Mrs. Whitman and Mrs. Delaney's two brothers were among the killed. The children at the mission were

ransomed from the Indians by Peter Skene Ogden, chief factor of the Hudson Bay company, and brought to the Willamette valley, where Mrs. Delaney was placed in the home of Dr. and Mrs. C. E. Gieger near Forest Grove. Mrs. Delaney was the last survivor of the Sager and Whitman families who went through the massacre.

Mrs. Delaney, better known to old timers in Cottage Grove as Mrs. Fultz, made an extended visit here in 1914 with her niece, Mrs. Ray Baker (at that time Miss Mildred Pringle) and with the late Mrs. L. M. Thompson.
