Motor Vehicles Increase
300 Per Cent 9 Years

Amount Paid in Taxes Per Car
Increase 66 Per Cent in
Same Period.

The Oregon motorist in 1927 paid but one and one-half per cent more in automobile taxes than he did in 1919, while the average increase for motorists throughout the United States was 16 per cent.

Investigation by the Oregon State Motor association shows that since 1919 Oregon has had an increase of nearly 300 per cent in motor vehicle registrations and only 66 per cent increase per motor vehicle on license plate and gasoline taxes. This increase was mainly by through adoption of an additional cent gas tax in 1923 and increased usage of the automobile brought about by an excellent system of highways, a further proof that good roads pay for themselves.

Since 1919 the number of motor vehicles throughout the United States has increased 150 per cent, while the tax per motor vehicle on license fees and gasoline has increased 278 per cent. The increase to each automobile owner in 1927 over 1920 was 16 per cent, while on the other hand the increase in registration was only 5.6 per cent. An average tax per car under these two heads for last year amounts to \$23.78, an increase of \$2.98 over that of 1926.

The colossal amount of \$552,629, \$28.16 was collected from motorists throughout the United States during 1927 from automobile license fees and gasoline taxes by the various states.

The gasoline tax, which originated in Oregon in 1919, has now been adopted in all but three states. Its popularity as a means of collecting revenue for highway purposes is attested by the fact

that last year this means of taxation brought into the coffers of the various states a total of \$254,000,000 as compared to \$298,000,000 collected from license fees.

To Attack the Dandelion.
Everybody who maintains a lawn has an especial grudge against the

dandelion and is willing to take some pains to get rid of it. Here is a remedy that is said to kill the plant without killing nearby grass: Pick the crown of the plant with a sharp stick dipped in a solution made as follows: Add one quarter ounce of white arsenic to half gallon water and boil ten minutes.

then add one gallon water and one-third ounce caustic soda and boil 15 or 20 minutes. Use soft water and an iron or granite kettle. Mixture is poisonous.
