Primary Contest Takes On Form Older Days

Charges of Crookedness and Dealings for Deputyships Are Denied.

The contest for the nominations for sheriff have taken on a tone that makes the campaign seem like one of the old-time affairs when life-long friendships were severed in arguments over the qualifications of a candidate. Lewis Kietzing, one candidate for the republican nomination, has charged the county clerk with crookedness in the preparation of the ballot. The charge grew from the fact, the clerk explains, that a few sample ballots were printed with Kietzing's name misplaced and with his residence stated as Davis, where Kietzing is registered, instead of Eugene as Kietzing wanted it. The error was corrected, the clerk explains, before the official ballots were printed.

A report gained some circulation that Frank Taylor, present sheriff but not a candidate for re-nomination, is slated for a position if Luckey is elected. Taylor has flatly denied this. The democratic candidates, Bowen and Earle, have also had to deny a rumor about an agreement as to one taking a deputyship under the other.

A day counting board will be used at the polls at the primary election in 50 of the largest precincts in the county, according to County Clerk Walter B. Dillard. These include those in the several cities of the county and the most thickly populated rural precincts. As soon as a certain number of ballots are cast the counting boards will begin work and the results in these precincts may be announced very soon after the polls close at 8 o'clock. In the precincts where there is only one board the counting will not be started until after the polls close.

Newton Jasper Huff Dies.
Funeral services for Newton Jasper Huff, who died suddenly May 3 at Noti, were held at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon at the Mills chapel. Pastor Duncan P. Cameron officiated. Interment was in the A. F. & A. M. O. O. F. cemetery by the father and mother.

Mr. Huff lived here many years. He was section foreman at Noti and formerly was section foreman at Conestock. He was born April 29, 1857, in Lodi, Cal.

Surviving relatives are two sisters, Mrs. Robert Lackey, Cottage Grove, and Mrs. Charles Conner, Delight Valley, and a brother, Finley Huff, Independence.

City Will Regulate Conduct of Bees

In response to a complaint that a neighbor's bees were making themselves a nuisance, the city council Monday night instructed the city attorney to draft an ordinance regulating the keeping and conduct of bees within the city limits. The bees probably will be told how late they may stay up at night, what time they may get up in the morning, will be prohibited from carrying weapons and from trespassing upon the anatomy of those who may not wish to meet socially the humble gatherers of honey.

Mayor G. O. Knowles is now receiving applications for the position of bee speed cop.

Mrs. Nancy Hutton Dies.
Mrs. Nancy Hutton, 70, died Monday at a Eugene hospital after a brief illness. Mrs. Hutton had been a resident of Oregon for 19 years and during that time lived in Cottage Grove, Dallas and Eugene.

Mrs. Hutton was born in Cumberland Gaps, Tenn., October 16, 1858. When a girl she moved with her family to Nevada. There she married William C. Hutton October 20, 1883.

In 1909 they moved to Dallas, Ore., where they lived until 1915. They then moved to Cottage Grove and lived there until 1920, when they returned to Dallas. In 1926 they came to Eugene to make their home with their son, Jack Horton.

Mrs. Hutton is survived by her husband, William C. Hutton, sons Jack, Eugene; John, Bakersfield, Cal.; Otto, Portland, and Ray, Bonanza; daughters, Mrs. Herbert Gallop and Mrs. Alva Friesen, Dallas; one brother, George Wibba, Chehalis, Wash.

McKenzie Pass Partly Open.

The McKenzie pass highway is open from Sisters to the mile high sign post, the state highway department rotary snow plow reaching the summit of the Cascade mountains in the mile high pass at noon Saturday. The plow was dispatched from the Blue River district two months ago to attempt opening the McKenzie highway which was then covered for a distance of about 25 miles with from three to six feet of snow. The work of opening the pass was hampered by the break down of the machinery, by drifts solid with ice and by a storm that raged over the mountains for more than a week.

R. N. A. Convention to Be Here.

The intercounty convention of the Royal Neighbors of America for 1929 will be held in this city, according to the vote of the 1928 convention held Friday in Eugene. Mrs. Esther Hohl was chosen president and Mrs. Nellie Blackmore secretary-treasurer of the intercounty organization for the year.

Seventeen members of the local organization attended Friday's convention and the memorial service was put on by the Cottage Grove members. A banquet was served to the delegates and visitors.

Aquariums Add To Beauty of Homes

That residents of this city take pride in their homes is shown by the number of attractive aquariums recently built. Mr. and Mrs. James P. Graham recently completed an oval shaped pool 15 by 10 feet and have stocked it with a dozen goldfish. The pond is situated in an attractive spot in the lawn and with a rock garden around it, makes a charming addition to the grounds. In the pool itself are growing pond lilies, umbrellas, plant and water iris. A fountain is located in the center. In the rock garden are ferns, bleeding heart, forget-me-nots, and orchids, violets, pansies and several other varieties of flowers.

An attractive pool with a rock garden around it has been built by Dale Wyatt. He will use it for goldfish and water lilies.

Dr. and Mrs. Harold Axley have built a large pool in addition to the smaller one they used for goldfish and lilies.

On the Herbert Eakin grounds has been built an irregular shaped pool complete with bird bath, fountain and rock garden. Mrs. Eakin plans to grow pond lilies in the pool.

STRAY BULLETS CAUSE DEATH, NEAR DEATHS

Stray bullets have been flying so thick and fast in the county that county officials are making a determined effort to stop carelessness with firearms.

One man and a horse have been killed by stray bullets within the past few months, other bullets have entered houses and others have struck cars on the highways. In several cases persons narrowly missed death or serious injury. In the case of the man who was killed it was found that the bullet had been fired by boys in play. Six stray bullets have been reported and it is probable that other near accidents have not been reported.

Cottage Grove Has 20th Of Votes of County

751 Republicans and 367 Democrats May Participate in Primaries.

The total registration in Cottage Grove in the two major parties for the primary is 1119. Under a recent amendment only those who are registered may vote and registration was discontinued a month before the primary in order to give the county clerk time to get out his poll books. Unusual care was necessary in this work to make certain that no registered name was overlooked. Despite repeated notice given that no votes may be sworn in at the polls, it is anticipated by officials that there will be many who will be prieved when they go to the polls and find that the old method is no longer in vogue.

Doing away with swearing in votes at the polls will greatly relieve election boards.

The number of registered voters for the city is slightly in excess of the number who may vote at the primary, when only republicans and democrats may participate, there being no ticket for prohibitionists, independents, socialists and members of other minor parties.

Of those who may vote at the primary, 367 are democrats and 752 republicans.

The total registration in the county is 21,031, so that Cottage Grove has one-twentieth of the entire vote of the county. Of the total registration for the county 14,923 are republicans and 6,096 democrats. There will be further registration before the general election.

Cottage Grove to Have Important Federal Port

The grounds secured by a chamber of commerce committee for a federal airport have been accepted by A. P. Tallaferra of the airways extension department of the federal department of commerce. So far as known here this is the only field in this section supported by the government. The field is the Emerson tract of 45 acres south of the city.

The federal government will place lights and buildings, mark the field and fence it. The chamber of commerce will be asked to plow and seed the ground.

This is considered a strategic point in the air service because of being at the divide of the Willamette and Umpqua valleys and the air business demanded an emergency field here. It is believed here that it will not be long until Cottage Grove will be a regular station of the air mail and that the airport will assume an importance not contemplated when negotiations for a field were started.

Shoestring Road Work Is to Start at Once

Former Main Highway to the South Is to Be Put in Condition Again.

Work is to start at once upon putting into condition for travel the abandoned Shoestring road from London leading over the mountains to a road in Douglas county. This was the only road to the south in pioneer days and the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company's main lines yet follow this route. It was abandoned about 10 years ago when the road through Pass creek canyon was completed.

Cottage Grove has long been interested in the reopening of this road, which would give residents of the Shoestring valley a direct route to this city. The road will also make another scenic drive for this section. Commissioner M. H. Anderson interested himself in this road soon after taking his office and had the cooperation of the road committee of the chamber of commerce. Securing the cooperation of Douglas county for its portion of the road has taken time. The section of road to be reopened is about six miles in length.

Commissioner Anderson, County Engineer Morse and Road Superintendent Tullar made an inspection of the route Saturday. It is now practically impassable even for horse-drawn vehicles although one car made the trip through last year.

Sessions will open at 9 a. m. Monday, on which day the local unions will entertain delegates at luncheon. Business men of Cottage Grove will be invited guests. On Tuesday evening the chamber of commerce and Lions club will entertain delegates and members of local unions at a banquet. The program is being arranged by a chamber of commerce committee.

On Tuesday evening an entertainment will be given by the high school orchestra under the direction of Miss Mary O. Prunes and Cherries To Be Light Crop

The prune crop, not only in Lane, but also in Douglas, Marion, Polk and other prune counties, will be a small one this year, according to Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart. The loss is due to the late rains during the pollination periods. Bings and Royal Anne cherries will also be light but in some orchards the bearing will be the heaviest in years.

The heavy crop will come from orchards having known pollinizers. Bees as pollinizers have had little influence upon these crops.

Mr. Stewart believes that the Loran pear orchards will show a fair crop and that pears generally will be fairly good. The weather of the past two weeks has been all that could be asked for the development of fruit and all other crops. Berries are expected to yield heavily.
