Codling Moths Flying.
Codling moth adults are now flying, making the first lead arsenate cover spray for apples and pears necessary at once if worms are to be killed before they enter the fruit, according to observations made at the experiment station at Corvallis.

Temperatures during the evening recently have been high enough for egg laying. Worms will hatch in six to eight days. The first cover spray will need to be completed not later than June 1 to keep the worms out of the fruit.

Lead arsenate is the standard control material. The powdered arsenate is used at 2 pounds to 100 gallons of spray solution. In

those regions where wormy apples are particularly difficult to prevent, the lead arsenate may be increased to 3 or 4 pounds to 100 gallons of spray solution.

Ten minutes before the time set for the game Sunday between the Cottage Grove Beavers and the Springfield team word was received here that Springfield could not come. A reason for breaking the date was not given. Pickup teams played a practice game.
