Mrs. Walter Latie suffered painful cuts about the head and Glen Dorrell sustained lacerations about the head in a collision between two cars two miles out on the Lane highway at about 7:30 Wednesday night. Other passengers in the two cars were badly shaken up but suffered no serious injury. The Latie baby suffered a cut on one wrist. The Dorrell boy was unconscious for some time following the accident.

The accident occurred on a bend of the road. The Laties had driven out to get a Taylor boy to take him swimming and were coming in to Cottage Grove at a fairly rapid speed. In turning the curve Mr. Latie drove on the inside, putting his car on the wrong side of the road. At that moment a car driven by H. Cook appeared around the curve. Mr. Latie attempted to swing over to the other side and as he put on his brakes to slow down, the rear end of the car swung around and struck the front end of the Cook car. Both cars were damaged but not to any great extent. The highway was blocked until the cars could be removed.
