Misses Myrtle and Thelma Kem visited during the past week in Dallas at the home of their brother Victor.

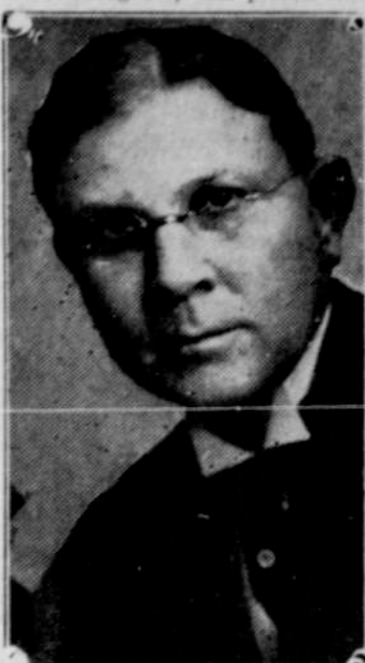
