LETTUCE NEEDS IODINE SAY SOIL SPECIALISTS

Iodine has been found to increase the growth of head lettuce, say soil specialists at the Oregon experiment station. Preliminary fertilizer experiments have been made in the college greenhouse and show a significant increase in growth from the inclusion of one part per million of iodine in the form of potassium iodine in water culture used for the production of head lettuce.

DR. STIVERS DESCRIBES VISIT TO HOLY LAND

A wood machine has been installed which is equipped to cut all lengths from 12 inch up to four feet. Six bins have been constructed for storing the wood. Dr. W. C. Sehlbrede Dies.

Mrs. C. H. Burkholder received word Monday that her brother-in-law, Dr. W. C. Sehlbrede, died in Billings, Mont., at 6:15 Sunday evening following a paralytic stroke. He was stricken while attending church and was removed to his apartment. He was aged 70 years.

Dr. Sehlbrede came to Cottage Grove in 1882 and practiced dentistry here for three years. He was married in 1885 to Miss Jennie Stouffer, after which they went to Livingston, Mont., later moving to Billings. Mrs. Sehlbrede died in Redding, Cal., in 1912 and Dr. Sehlbrede remarried in 1914. Surviving relatives are the widow, a son Clarence and two grandchildren. Funeral services and interment were in Billings, where a two-year old daughter is buried.
