Wool Brings Good Price. The wool market is firm and strong. Latest quotations, compiled by the United States department of agricultural economics, are: Fine combing, \$1.18-\$1.23; French combing, \$1.10-\$1.15; fine clothing, \$1.05-\$1.10; half-blood combing, \$1.12-\$1.15; half-blood clothing, \$1.05-\$1.10; three-eighths combing, \$1.05-\$1.10; three-eighths clothing, \$1.05-\$1.10; 1/2 blood combing, 95c-\$1.03; 1/2 blood clothing, 85c-90c. This means the cleaned product. The natural fleeces in dirt and grease would be about one-third the price per pound above quoted, except in the three-eighths and quarter bloods, wherein the shrinkage is not so great.

Salem Team Fined \$50. Salem has been fined \$50 by officials of the Willamette valley baseball league for forfeiting a game to Albany. The manager of the Salem team was reinstated following his automatic suspension when he was ordered to leave the field in the Albany game.

A definite schedule for the second half of the season will be made at a meeting to be called within the next two weeks.

All postponed games will be played on July 8. Bend and Eugene will play at Eugene, Salem will play at Wendling and Albany will play here.

Dr. DeBar Is Injured. Dr. George O. B. DeBar, Eugene physician, sustained a fractured leg and was badly bruised Tuesday night when he stepped from his car in front of an automobile at his home. He was taken to the Pacific Christian hospital. The driver of the car, who is said to live at the same place, was unable to see Dr. DeBar as he stepped out into the street from under some shade trees, police who investigated reported. The injury is not serious, members of the family said.

Refund Case to Be Appealed. Decision of the state supreme court declaring that the state has no share of the Oregon & California land grant tax refund will be carried to the United States supreme court by the state, according to Judge C. P. Barnard of the Lane county court.

Judge Barnard was at Roseburg Friday evening to attend a meeting of representatives of the 18 land grant counties to discuss plans in the legal battle between the state and the land grant counties.

The opinion of the county officials is that the state in appealing the case to the United States supreme court is incurring unnecessary expense.

Students Are Wanted. Professor W. W. Sullivan of Albany college was a visitor here Tuesday and addressed the noon luncheon of the chamber of commerce briefly. He outlined the method of self-help employed by the college to help children to get an education and said that it is desired to have one or two pupils from Cottage Grove next year. He spoke of the self-help students who have become prominent in the nation's life, including Herbert Hoover, once a student at Pacific college, Oregon, and Al Smith, the two presidential nominees.

Car Sales Heavy. On the first day of sale of half-year temporary auto license tags Monday at the office of Sheriff Frank E. Taylor 240 were issued, this being a new one-day record for Lane county.
