Freak Varieties Tried By Experiment Station

Seed Promising Phenomenal Results Has Never Been Worth High Price.

New crops of "phenomenal" varieties of present crops bought by growers at fancy prices are ordinarily of little value as compared to standard varieties now in use, warns D. D. Hill, instructor in farm crops at the state college, who adds that testing such new introductions is one of the functions of the experiment station where the work can be done thoroughly and at less cost than by individuals.

"Interest among farmers in untried and freak varieties is a perfectly natural one, as every progressive farmer is interested in increasing the yields of his crops," said Mr. Hill. "The trouble is that in most cases of these spectacular crops the grower pays a fancy price and then must be content with a reduced instead of an increased return."

"Some of the outstanding freaks sold in Oregon in past years are the Alaska or Titanic wheat, also called Miracle and Seven-Headed; Polish wheat, Speltz and various black barleys or oats. The notorious Alaska wheat did not produce big yields and the quality was poor. The Polish wheat or Jerusalem eye is grown only in a few places in the world and on poor soil. Millers will not take it at all."

"Then there was the notorious Burbank Sup wheat which sold a few years ago for as high as \$1 a pound for seed. It was supposed to resist all diseases and have all the advantages with no shortcomings. Later it proved to be merely a winter life common variety of no real importance."

"Except as a pasture on the farm, comparing varieties of farm crops as to yield and economic value presents technical aspects best determined at the experiment station. The station is greatly interested in production and dissemination of the best varieties and is always glad to try out new varieties and compare them with the old. Hundreds are being tried out all the time."

Original Herd Of Moose Passing

SILTWOOD, Ore., June 29.—The last of the older cow moose that were brought to this district six years ago was found dead a short time ago floating in the water at the mouth of Fiddle creek. This leaves only one of the original herd that was brought into the government reserve at Kroll on Lake Tahkenitch. For the first few years after they were placed on the reserve the government furnished a caretaker for them, but later they wandered off the reservation to the Fiddle creek district. One of the bulls of the original herd was found dead where it had caught its front legs in a pile of logs and Game Warden Fish disposed of the carcass. One was killed when it was knocked off a bridge by a Southern Pacific train and now there is only one bull moose of the original herd. There are, however, a three-year-old cow and two-year-old bull twins.

ELEVEN NEW PULP MILLS ARE ON COAST

There are now in the Columbia basin country, adjacent to Portland, and in the Puget sound country 11 new pulp and paper mill enterprises. When these plants are all completed and operating they will produce 500 tons a day. This production will, in the opinion of experts, only take care of a part of the natural increase of consumption of pulp. It will be some time before domestic production will cut into the heavy importations. Oregon and the northwest's hemlock and spruce are now being used by many middle-west paper mills. The water freight rate on pulp, Portland to New York and Atlantic seaboard points, is the same as from Michigan to New York, so that the coast is a factor in the big game of paper production. The pulp industry has a big field and there need be no apprehension about over-development for projects rightly financed and engineered by paper mill experts who know how to get their stuff to market.

NEW AUTO CAMP BOOKLET IS AID TO MOTORISTS

Ten hundred sixty-eight auto camps on the Pacific coast with detailed road maps have been listed in a new 1928 auto camp booklet which is being distributed free through the service stations of the Associated Oil company and its resellers.

The booklet gives the facilities of auto camps located on the highways from the Mexican to the Canadian border. The camps appear in alphabetical order under counties, with the distance to the nearest large town. They have key numbers to make locating them easy. These maps are an unusual feature of such a compact, pocket-size booklet. A twenty-two inch spread of California covers all sizeable towns, rivers, mountains and roads. Equally comprehensive are the other maps of Oregon, Washington and Nevada. With hunting and fishing information they provide the motorist with an authentic vacation guide.

Marked Activity Noted In Dorena Neighborhood

Government Starts Work; Mill Dam Nears Completion; Berries Good.

(Howard's News Service.) DORENA, Ore., June 30.—(Special.)—The forest service road camp with headquarters just this side of Lundpark on Frank Brice creek road into the Bohemia mining district, is now thoroughly organized and the work of correcting curves and cutting down points is going on smoothly. The crew consists of eight or ten men, several of them seasoned government road builders. While this work is being done under the supervision of District Ranger Ray Engles, with headquarters at Rujada, Lane county is bearing part of the cost. Harry Mayben, who has been in the road department for a number of years, is in charge.

Work on the Anderson & Middleton Lumber company dam, about a mile above the mouth of Fiddle creek, is now rapidly nearing completion, but it may require two months to complete the structure in detail. During the past week the crew has been doubled. It is understood that Welcome Hubbell of Cottage Grove will be on the job immediately after the Fourth with a crew of men to lay the cement work for the spillway. This dam will not only in the future be the source of log supply for a mill, which is being planned for construction immediately below the dam site, but it is also intended to hold a reserve supply of logs for the other mills of the company at Cottage Grove. The company is non-committal as to when activities will start.

Ray Van Schoick, office man and general overseer in the absence of Engles at forest service headquarters at Rujada, visited Cottage Grove recently and said that the work of the district is now thoroughly organized for trial building and protective measures. Ranger Engles and a number of other service men from this district are at Tillamook attending a forest service school now in session there.

Last year was said to have been a banner year for wild blackberries throughout the timber cuttings near Culp Creek, where hundreds of gallons of fruit were picked by local people as well as by many who came from miles away. In some instances families made good money during the season filling orders at \$1 a gallon. This year has last year's wild berry crop beat a mile, an uncommon occurrence, as it is seldom that one heavy crop follows another. It is said that many families in the vicinity of Culp Creek have already stocked their larders far beyond their usual supply and the season is only starting. Many are now picking for market and to fill private orders. One man is authorized for the statement that he picked six gallons one forenoon and when he quit for the day he was in a patch from which he could have taken nine gallons in the afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Bogan are visiting Mrs. Bogan's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wes Christman, at Bedrock at the mouth of Teters creek. Mr. Bogan is second in charge of the bookkeeping division of the Long-Bell Lumber company and the younger couple are down for their usual summer visit home. It is understood that Lib Gillespie has sold his farm on Row river, the transfer having been made early this week to a newcomer from Nebraska, whose name was not available at this writing. The Gillespie farm is on the south bank of Row river, adjoining the old mill site of the Bohemia Lumber company. It was formerly the S. J. Vaughn homestead, consisting of 160 acres, a large part of which is under cultivation and is said to be a very desirable stock or dairy ranch.

Work on New Bridge Starts.

Work has been started on a new bridge across Row-river at Frank Brice creek, according to Arthur N. Striker, county bridge superintendent. The bridge will have a span of 90 feet.

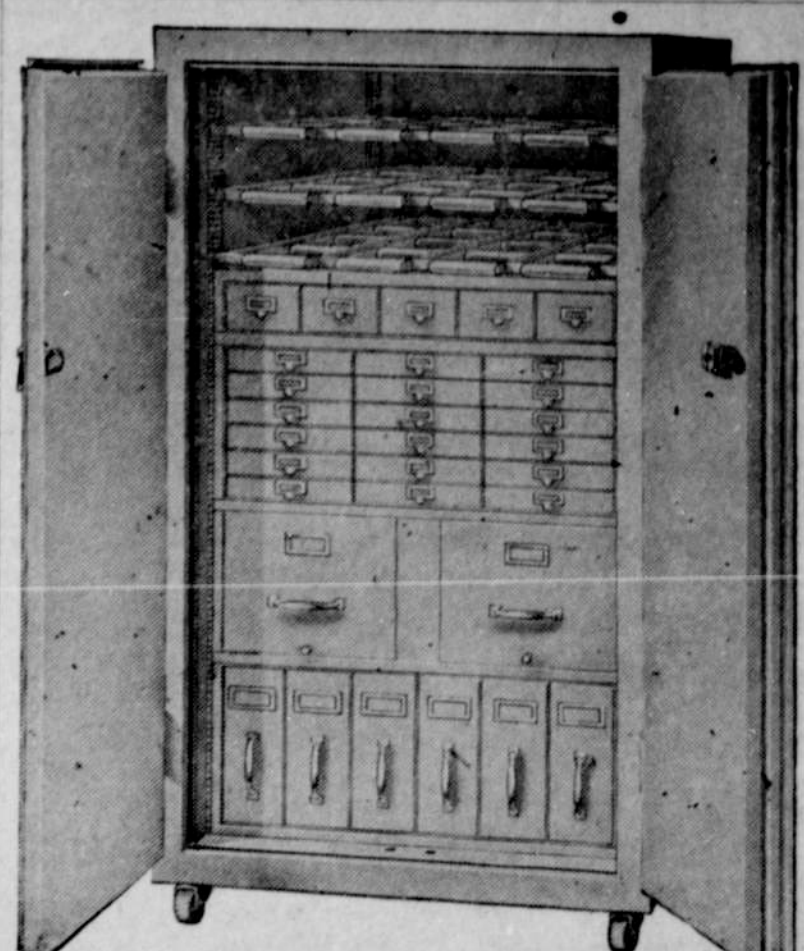

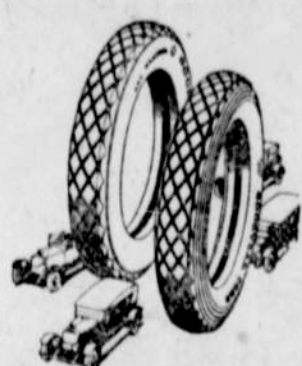
