Robbers of Pharmacy Believed Held Eugene

Two men said to have been attempting to steal a car in Eugene Friday are being held in Eugene suspected of having robbed the Cottage Grove Pharmacy which was entered Wednesday of last week and merchandise to the value of \$100 taken.

Hiram Cotter and Frank Gora are the names given by the two suspects and Eugene police say both are ex-convicts. A bill fold and a pocket knife, both positively identified as having been taken from the local pharmacy, were found in their possession, police say. The description of the two men is said to tally exactly with that of two men who spent several days here last week. Other loot from the drug store was not located. The two men will be given a hearing in Eugene.

Eugene police were puzzled last week by the finding of several pieces of wearing apparel in a yard on Agate street, shortly after the Cottage Grove robbery, and it is believed that a man who may have been the Cottage Grove burglar changed clothes behind the house, throwing his old ones away and donning a new outfit. Footprints were found leading from the railroad tracks near the house. A sweater, a coat and a pair of trousers were found back of the dwelling. No clues were found in the clothing except a label which indicated the coat had been purchased at Kelso, Wash.

Production Newspaper Increases

Production of newspaper in North America increased 73,038 tons or 6 per cent over the first four months of 1927 during the first four months of 1928, according to figures just issued by the News Print Service bureau, New York. Production in the United States fell from 518,447 tons to 471,962 tons, but the Canadian increase for the period of 114,028 tons over the 1927 record of 654,264 tons, together with slight increases in Newfoundland and Mexico, accounted for an increase.

Canadian production during April was 192,645; United States, 117,533; North America, 328,995. Canadian mills operated at 84.3 per cent capacity; those in the United States at 83.8 per cent. Canadian stocks at the mill totaled 46,641 tons at the end of April; those of the United States 33,374.

Shipments for the month were Canada, 193,443; United States, 118,453; for the quarter, Canada, 759,259, as compared with 643,903 in 1927; United States, 457,832, as compared with 506,202 in 1927.
