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STUDENTS AND COLLEGES.

"Not only are University of Oregon students ambitious and earnest but their ideals and moral standards are unusually high, they know what they are there for, have definite aims and ambitions and realize the value of the education they are receiving." PLENTY IN COOS.

The Cottage Grove Sentinel says that "With a wet president and with wet governors we can easily believe that prohibition enforcement would be lax. Tour Irrigated Farms To Be Held Tomorrow

The third annual tour to be conducted by the Lane County Horticultural society, cooperating with the county agent, to observe and study supplemental irrigation systems used in growing truck crops will be held Friday, July 20. The itinerary for the tour, with a statement of the type of pumping plant, source of power, method of distributing water, and crops being grown on each farm follows:

9:30—Wendell Bartholomew place on river loop 2, lower Santa Clara, mile from Pacific highway. Small overhead sprinkler system attached to household pressure system. Electric motor. Miscellaneous truck crops.

10:30—Dun Shaffer place on River avenue, quarter mile east of Pacific highway. Large capacity bulldozer type pump attached to overhead sprinkler system with oscillators. Electric motor. Miscellaneous truck crops.

12:30—Chase Gardens. Centrifugal pump attached to large overhead sprinkler system. Also has centrifugal pump operating a flooding system. Both pumps are driven by electric motors. Miscellaneous greenhouse and outdoor truck crops.

4:00—Frank Bartholomew place on McKenzie river about four miles northeast of Springfield. Portable gasoline engine driven centrifugal pump. Irrigates by flooding. Has potatoes, beans, beets, cabbage and other truck crops. Mr. Bartholomew has a good demonstration of fertilizers on early potatoes.

F. E. Price, extension engineer of Oregon Agricultural college, will take part in the tour and discuss various irrigation problems. All persons interested in supplemental irrigation systems are invited to take part in the tour.

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FEDERAL PLANE MAY BE PURCHASED BY CITY

Cottage Grove may get an airplane from the federal government, to be used for instructional purposes. The cost is said to be only one dollar, but the provision goes with the sale that the plane must be dismantled and never again used in the air. The government is discarding its out-of-date planes but does not wish to junk them. For this reason they are being given away for instructional purposes. Only cities can secure them.

The proposition that the city secure one of the planes was made to the council Monday night by C. A. Bartlett, representing the Lions club. Before the city will make the purchase it will be necessary for the Aero club or some other organization to arrange a building for the care of the machine and to guarantee maintenance.

320 ACRES AT RUJADA CLOSED FOR SEASON

An area of land comprising approximately 320 acres, including the right of way for the Anderson & Middleton Lumber company at Rujada, and adjoining territory located a quarter of a mile north of Layng creek between Juniata and Herman creeks in sections 15, 21 and 22, township 22 south, range 1 east, has been closed to all travel for the season. The order comes from the forestry department, according to Ray Engles, forest ranger, on account of the great fire hazard in that section. The closure will not interfere with travel into the watershed by way of the trail, which follows the south side of Layng creek and is outside of the closed area.

Classes in Swimming Start at Playgrounds

Swimming in connection with the public playground will begin tomorrow afternoon and the tank near the O. P. & E. "Y" will be used again this year. Classes will be held there on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The hours are as follows: Beginners, 1:30 to 2:30; intermediates, 2:30 to 3:30; events, 3:30 to 4:30. Tuesday and Thursday afternoons the children will be cared for at the park. The playground will be closed Saturday afternoons.

Children between the ages of 12 and 16 will have tennis in the forenoon from 9 to 10. They will meet at the playground and will take their own rackets and balls. From 10 to 12 in the forenoon children of the same age will play baseball. Games will be arranged and, at the close of the season, letters will be awarded to an all star team picked from the various teams. A horse shoe tournament is also being arranged.

For children under the age of 12 games will be planned for the hours of 9 to 11 in the forenoon. From 11 to 12 will be the story hour. Each Saturday forenoon the older children will meet in the park at 8 o'clock and go for a hike, which probably will take all forenoon.

The average attendance at the playground has been 50, with the greatest number present last Thursday and Friday afternoons, when 75 attended.

Miss Thelma Kem and Miss Irene Griggs are supervisors this year and keen interest is being shown.

when it may be necessary for him to visit the station at Musick. The lookout is a two-story affair about 12 feet square. In the upper story is the fire finding equipment. In the lower story are parlor, bedroom and sink, living room, kitchen, dining room, library, business office and telephone exchange. The lookout man, with all the world spread out around him, has no privacy. Every side of his home is of glass.

Silica Mountain.

At Silica mountain we found George Hewett and Frank Coons building a ranger shelter at the foot of the mountain, getting their material in the manner already described. On top of the mountain, a mile and a half or more by trail from the ranger shelter, all preparations had been made for a ranger to make his home there during such time as may be required during the fire season. No look-out remains there, however, except by special order or when a lightning storm is expected or is in progress.

A tall fir has been cut off 60 feet from the ground and on top of this is a perch in which the fire finding equipment has been placed. The perch is reached by a ladder built up the side of the tree from material found at hand, and firmly attached at intervals to the tree. I didn't make the 60 foot ascent at the first attempt, but I learned afterward that some of the rangers make more than one trial the first time, and then I didn't feel so foolish.

Looking down 40 or 50 feet from a position on a ladder rising perpendicularly doesn't give courage to one not used to high climbing and the remaining 10 or 20 feet looks like a heck of a way.

The VanSchoick mentioned, as well as Ray VanSchoick, assistant to Ranger Ray Engles at Rujada, are sons of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. VanSchoick, well known residents up Dorena way. Ben Prince's mother is a resident of Cottage Grove. Alta Kelly is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kelly, old timers of this section. Whitely is an O. A. C. student from California holding down his first job with the service. George Hewett and Frank Coons are both well known in Cottage Grove.

Rangers Welcome Company.

The boys seem to enjoy life in the great out-of-doors, but it has its disadvantages. Mr. Coons, for example, received word in a letter which we carried in that his wife had undergone an operation at Dallas on July 2. We were there July 11.

The forest service boys were without exception glad to have company and were courteously hospitable, in each instance issuing invitations to call again. When they leave their cabins or shelters they leave a supply of both food and fuel which may be used by any who may drop in hungry and cold, or just hungry.

Canned Goods Save Rangers.

I haven't the least idea what would happen to the forest service boys if no one had invented canned goods. Fragile stuff can't be conveniently packed in on mules over rough grades and trails, but canned goods can be carried anywhere. The one piece of cutlery which is absolutely essential in the culinary department of a ranger's headquarters is a can opener. I cooked the first meal (although I am carefully concealing this from my wife). It was a good meal. Any meal would have tasted good after a day in the open, especially when it was the noon meal being served at about 4 o'clock. It consisted of a tasty beef stew taken from a can and warmed through, roast beef and sweet potatoes taken from cans and warmed up, cherries from a can, cookies from a carton, and coffee. The only thing not taken from a prepared can or carton was the fire that warmed the meal.

Tom Parker Is on Job.

At the road camp on the Brice creek road I found Harry Mayben in charge of a crew of eight men, with Mrs. Mayben as cook. I believe Mrs. Mayben's services are the reason why it is easy to get men to work the road and why they look so happy and contented. At any rate I know that she served one first class meal. One of the prominent members of the crew is "Painless" Tom Parker, who many years ago was the donut king of Cottage Grove, with headquarters opposite the city jail. He has been with government road crews for several years. Following the meal, Tom jazzed his Dodge roadster down the road to Rujada to put me in touch with my own car.

Mountain Road Becomes Boulevard.

Those who have not travelled this road within the past year or two will hardly recognize the present road. All the bad grades below Landpark have been removed. Arbuckle hill, Thompson's Tipover hill, Bear Log hill, Martha's Well hill, Maiden's Prayer hill and several others are no more. Those may not be the correct names, but they are the ones used by Tom, and he knew all the old hills like they were members of his family, for he travelled and "cussed" all of them many hundreds of times. Thompson's Tipover hill was named for Arch Thompson, former resident of this city, who tipped over a load of poles on the hill and never took the trouble to recover them. The other names are suggestive of their origin. About a mile of road is closed because of being a quagmire that no car can get through. Oddly this is right at the road camp. By the end of the season there will be no finer boulevard drive anywhere than as far as Landpark from Diston. The road above Landpark to Champion is in excellent condition, largely due to work done last year and because of the excellent system of drainage which keeps the surface from being washed away. The only complaint of this road is that it is extremely narrow, with turns only a mile or more apart. It seems odd to see such an excellent road in a district where there is so little traffic that lack of turns has caused little inconvenience.

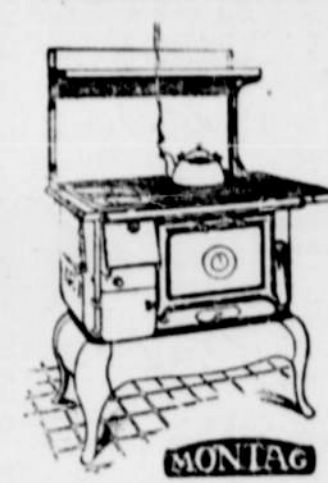
Painless Tom Provides Signs.

"Painless" Tom is an expert in

designing amusing signs. He has warned motorists of the danger of the quagmire already referred to, with a sign: "End of pavement, drive slow." At Landpark there has for years been a sign: "Speed limit 60 miles." A speed of more than six miles would be reckless at the point where the sign emblazons its warning to the world. The road is to be kept in condition with a mammoth road plane

now under construction at the road camp and being built the correct width for the roads on which it is to be used.
