National C. of C. Is Fighting for Farmer

Farm Relief Is Opposed but
Higher Tariffs Are Greatly Favored.

That the United States chamber of commerce is bending its energies toward solution of problems of the farmers was stated by Frank B. Barnes, field manager of the United States chamber of commerce, who spoke today at the noon luncheon of the Lions club. He said that a referendum vote is to be taken within the next few weeks among the membership of the United States on proposals of a large committee in the organization which has stated the position of the federal chamber to be in opposition to such proposed forms of relief as the McNary-Haugen bill, as opposed to spending any more government money in reclaiming lands to be placed in opposition with lands not now able to pay the cost of operation, as favorable to cooperative marketing and favorable to high tariffs on all articles produced by farmers of this country. If two-thirds of the membership votes for these proposals, they will then be placed before congress as the sentiment of a million business men.

Mr. Barnes spoke of a survey taken in 11 cities large and small of the country to learn the methods and costs of distribution. It was found that in these 11 cities there are 22,000 stores doing a gross weekly business of not more than \$44 each, thereby greatly increasing the cost of getting products to the consumer. He said that the 500,000 tax money spending units of the country are disposing of \$36,000,000 daily and he told of results in reducing taxes secured by action of committees of business men.

License Bills Bring Halt in Road Program

No Future Construction Can
Be Outlined Until After
Election in November.

Oregon motorists and taxpayers will be interested in the fact that the so-called \$3 and \$5 license measures, which would have affected the state highway program, will not appear on the November ballot, as the necessary signatures to initiative petitions were not filed in Salem in time.

The public mind has become confused through extensive preliminary discussion in the state press of these bills, and it should be pointed out that the only measures relating to motor vehicle licenses and a tax on gasoline which will have a place on the ballot are those initiated by Joe Dunne of Portland.

Mr. Dunne's license bill provides for a general reduction in license fees of approximately 50 per cent. If this bill should be approved by the people in November, the state highway fund would lose about \$3,000,000. The other initiative measure would increase the gasoline tax from three to five cents the gallon. If the latter measure should pass, the state's income from the gas tax would be increased about \$1,200,000, leaving the highway department with a net loss of nearly \$2,000,000. Should the people approve the decreased license fees set up in the Dunne bill and reject the increased gas tax of his other bill, the net loss to the highway fund would amount to a sum equivalent to that now available for new construction and betterments. Under this threatening situation, the highway commission has been forced to call a halt in its contemplated program for next year and to hold in abeyance any expenditure other than maintenance and the mandatory payments of principal and interest on road bonds.

Bedford Is Fined \$10.
Edward Bedford of Dorena was fined \$10 by Acting Judge Jesse G. Wells of the justice court here Tuesday afternoon on a charge of assault and battery upon Wayne Kirk, also of Dorena.

Bedford declared that Kirk in suited his wife and he proceeded to thrash him. When he appeared in court he seemed to think that he might be let off when the circumstances were made known, but Judge Wells advised him to see an attorney. His attorney advised him to plead guilty.—Eugene Register.

Creswell Store Entered by Youths.
The youths who lowered the ages of 17 and 18 are believed to have been responsible for the robbery of a butcher shop and Stone's store Tuesday night in Creswell. About \$4 was taken from the butcher shop and two complete outfits of clothing from the store. Two poorly dressed youths were seen about Creswell during the day and clothing answering the description of that worn by the two was found in the store when the robbery was discovered Wednesday morning.

Frank Rogers, deputy sheriff who investigated, found several finger prints at the stores entered. It is believed the pair went north and officials in that direction have been notified.

Hatchery to Be Moved.
That the fish commission of Oregon will cooperate with the Lane county court in obtaining right-of-way for the improvement of Willamette highway is the report of John C. Venable, commission member, in a letter to M. H. Anderson, county commissioner. The proposed right of way passes through state hatchery property. The county has agreed to furnish 750 feet of eight-inch wooden pipe needed in changing the hatchery location. Willingness to bear all other expenses of the change to meet the needs of the county is reported by the commission.
