IS AUTO CRASH VICTIM

W. J. Stow, Creswell, is in a critical condition at a Eugene hospital suffering from injuries received when the wagon and team of horses, he was driving were crowded into the ditch at Camas Swale on Pacific highway near Creswell.

Physicians reported that Mr. Stow sustained a fractured skull, fractured upper and lower jaw bones, several broken ribs, a deep cut from his chin to one ear and other cuts and bruises.

The car was being driven by George Fortune Motion of British Columbia and a suit for \$25,000 has been filed against him on behalf of Mr. Stow.

It was alleged by Mr. Motion that a second car crowded him against the wagon and that the second car failed to stop. An effort was made to stop the second car at Cottage Grove, but the description was so meager that the effort was without result and there is some doubt as to whether there was a second car in the accident.

Ocean's Strangest Creature

Country's Gold Coinage

Free and unlimited coinage of gold exists in the United States. Standard gold bullion may be deposited at the mint and at the assay offices in any amount, to be coined for the benefit of the depositor, without charge for coinage, but when other than standard bullion is received for coinage a charge is made for parting or refining, or for alloy, as the case may be. Refusal of gold bullion of less value than \$100, or when it is too base for coinage, may be made at the mints.

Requisites for Collies

No color standard has been set by the Collie club for individuals of the breed, but the dogs of black or tan with a white frill and collar, the showy sable with white markings, and the blue merles are most sought by present-day fanciers. The collie standard requires that males of the breed measure about 24 inches at the shoulder and females approximately 22 inches. The weight of a mature dog should approximate 60 pounds and the bitch 50 pounds.

Plodder's Chances Good
At Oregon University

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—(Special.)—The bright young fellow who "plods," his way through high school without much studying, who then comes on to the University of Oregon, receives a rating higher than average in the mental tests, and then thinks he can loaf and have a good time here is doomed to disappointment and in many cases an early trip home. This is revealed in the study of the mental tests given to entering students here under the direction of Dr. Howard R. Taylor, professor of psychology.

On the other hand, the plodding type of student who found it necessary to study in order to keep up with his high school classes, who comes on to college and receives only an average or even a below average rating in the mental test, still has an excellent chance of passing his courses here creditably, and at least has little difficulty in remaining in the university.

The explanation for this is simple, says Dr. Taylor. The "bright" student never formed any study habits in high school, and is unable to adjust himself to the demands made for passing scholarship in the university. The slower student has his study and work habits formed, and it is only necessary for him to apply himself more vigorously to succeed. These facts have been definitely proved by statistics compiled as a result of the tests made and high school and college records studied.

Mental tests are regarded at the university as very useful in many ways, but their use is kept within the bounds of reason and every student is given every opportunity, regardless of the results of the tests.

William Calvert Dies. William Calvert, pioneer of Junction City, died Thursday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Louis Robinson of Horton. Mr. Calvert, who was 82 years and 6 months of age, had been in his usual health until Tuesday when he was overcome with the heat.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon.
