Hens Should Eat Late.

Successful Oregon poultrymen aim to have their hens go to roost at night with a full crop, as egg production is not possible on scant feed. The Oregon experiment station finds it is advantageous to keep them busy and see that all the feed is cleaned up in the morning, but any under feeding soon stops production. The average hen consumes about 4 ounces of feed a day, the amount varying with the season.
