ROW RIVER NOTES.

Mr. and Mrs. Alf Williams, who have for a number of years resided on their farm a few miles above Culp Creek, are this week making a temporary home in Cottage Grove. Mr. Williams is employed by J. H. Chambers & Son.

Work of clearing the new right-of-way for the change in the road from near the mouth of Sharps creek to Diaton has been held up several days on account of a review of the survey at a given point. The new bridge across Row river is now rapidly nearing completion.

The Glen Anderson & Son saw-mill at Culp Creek, recently purchased by Holmberg brothers of Forest Grove, is shut down and probably will not operate for two weeks, owing to repair work. Installation of a new trim saw and other machinery. Timber on Sharps creek has been secured and the company will let a logging contract, as well as a trucking contract, for delivery of logs to the mill.
