MORNING GLORY KILLED BY SPRAY OF CHLORATE

As a result of an experiment with sodium chlorate spray on wild morning glory, William James on Goodpasture island has reported to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, that he successfully killed morning glory but warns users of the spray to be cautious.

Mr. James found that by using an extremely fine spray, which drifted from the scene of operations, he damaged crop left as far as 150 yards away. The sodium chloride, however, will kill the wild morning glory, Canadian thistle and wild blackberry—and also melon plants and other cultivated crops unless care is taken.

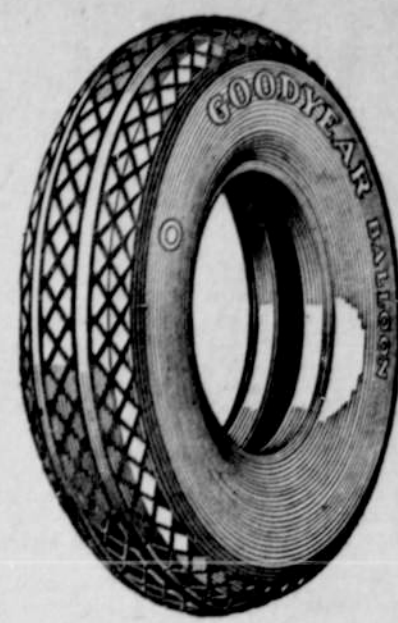
