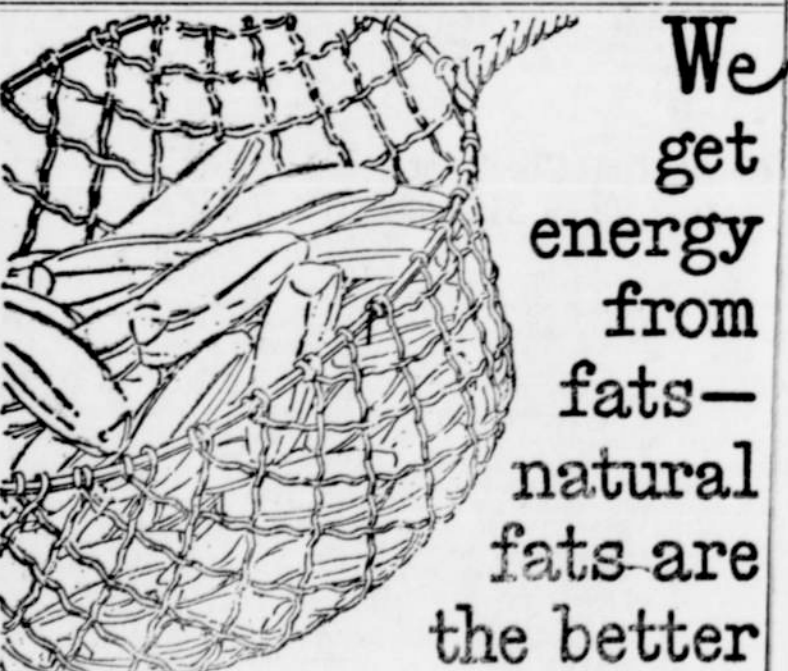

Try This for Deep Fat Frying

Fruit Fritters
1 cup flour
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup milk or water
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
Beat eggs well with milk, add sifted dry ingredients and beat until smooth. Use this batter for dipping sliced apples (with or without skins), whole small bananas, small peeled oranges or thick, drained slices of larger oranges, sliced pineapple or quartered fresh pears; slide quickly into hot lard (350° to 375° F.) and cook until fruit is soft. Drain and serve sprinkled with powdered sugar. Or, Grape, loganberry or currant jelly is especially delicious with banana or apple fritters.
