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LIQUOR IS AN ISSUE.

We are violently informed through the usually reliable and always readable Portland Spectator that the Portland Telegram is privately, politically, publicly and personally dry. In addition to this astonishing information the Spectator tells us that the Telegram has said that prohibition is not an issue because as president Hoover could not enforce it and Smith as president could not repeal it. The Spectator which, we judge from frequent reading of its bristling columns, columns which could not be so entertainingly filled by one who looked too often into the cup that inebriates, is not exactly pleased with the prohibition law, gives the further astounding information that three presidents have been unable to enforce prohibition, despite the power of their office and the huge enforcement fund at their command.

This is a serious condition indeed, but we have been just as reliably informed that prohibition is being enforced and that the people, compelled to give up liquor, are more sober than ever before in the history of the country, that they are more prosperous than the people of any nation have ever been, that the population would be decimated by drunken operators of automobiles were it not that booze is so hard to obtain.

After consideration of this able testimony on both sides, our judgment is that there have been some infractions of the prohibition law, that no president will be able to make the country completely dry, and no president could repeal prohibition, but the assertion that prohibition is not an issue leads one to believe that the writer had imbibed too freely of the kind of stuff that makes a fellow dare to do anything. The usually thoughtful and usually thoroughly informative Spectator neglects to inform us upon the important point as to the degree of sobriety of the one who made the assertion quoted.

The Sentinel doesn't agree with those who paint Al Smith as a red-nosed sot and an alcoholic nincompoop. He probably doesn't use as much liquor as some of those whose names are painted in letters bright in the history of our country. We believe that it would be a disgraceful thing to elect a president merely because he is said to stand for whisky. Liquor should not be an issue upon which presidents are elected. That is an issue that should be settled outside of a presidential contest.

But, regardless of what ought to be, Al Smith is going to get a tremendous number of republican votes because of his views on the prohibition question and Hoover is going to get a tremendous number of democratic votes because he is on the anti-liquor side. It has always been our belief that things that cause the electorate to turn in large numbers to a candidate are issues. On this basis the prohibition question is about the biggest issue we have.

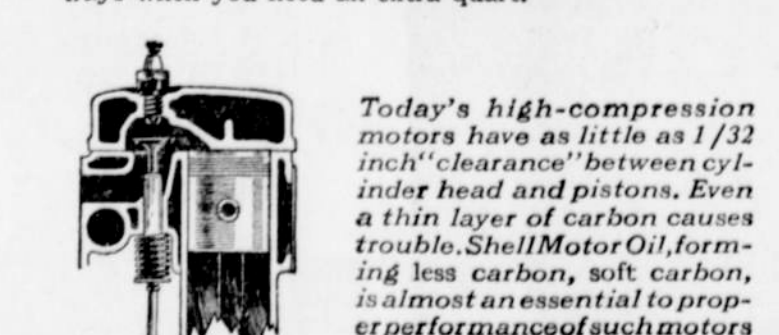

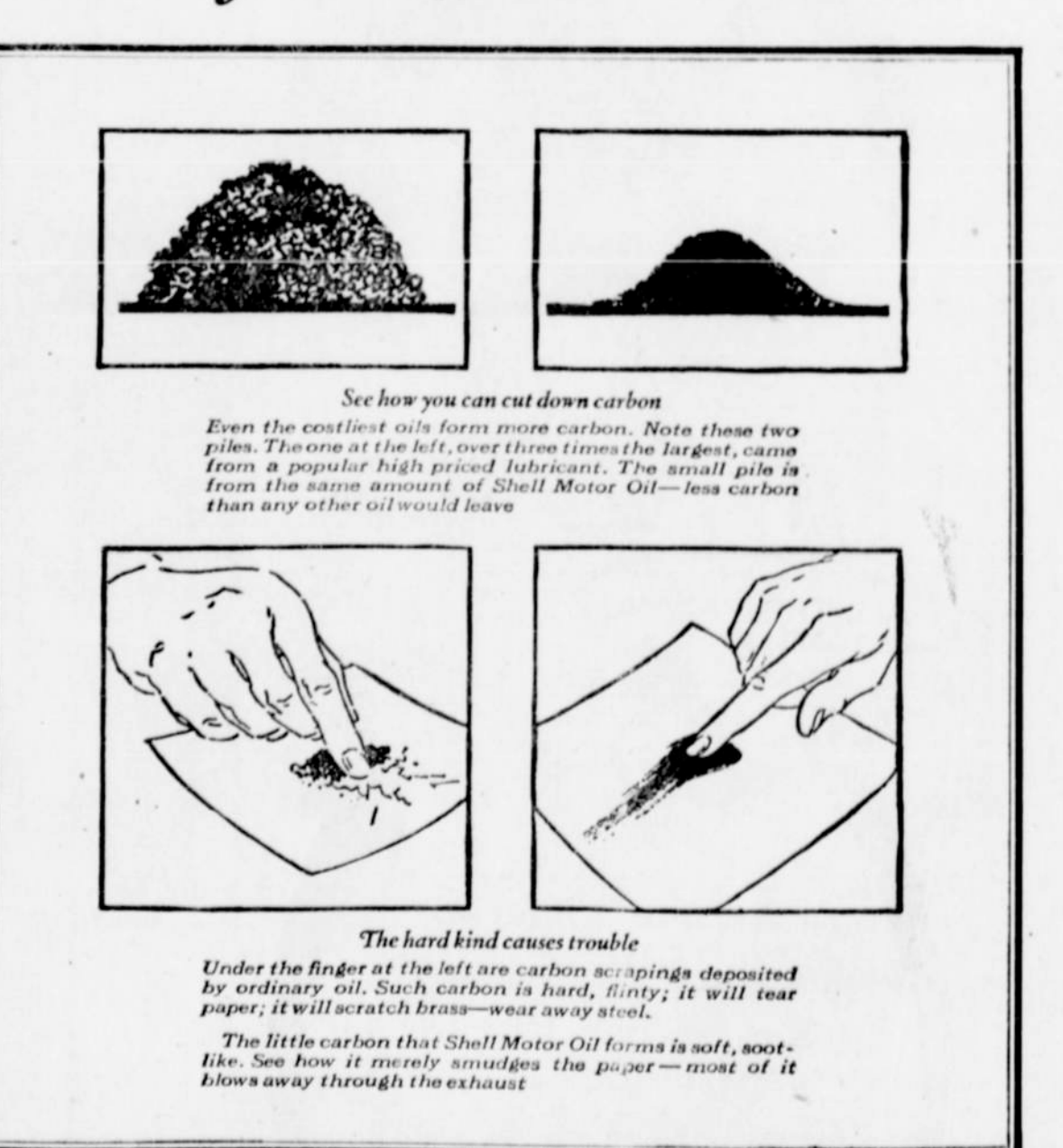
