'Round the Circle

Mr. Brooks was on the job bright and early. The ground was thoroughly prepared and planted. About the time the crop began to show well in the rows, the pumping plant was installed and thirsty roots were supplied with the water they craved. It isn't a large garden but it contains about everything that a family may wish for in the vegetable line, and a liberal amount to spare, besides a patch of millet, said to be an ideal feed for either cows or poultry. That little patch of barren soil in this short interval has grown into a thing of beauty, attractive to the eye of the passerby.

CULP CREEK.—Holmberg Bros., successors to Glen Anderson & Son in the saw mill at Culp Creek, have not definitely decided when the mill will be put into operation. However, the new owners are busy making extensive repairs and improvements in the mill and in cleaning up the yard. When the mill was taken over more than 100,000 feet of good stock was in the yard, a considerable proportion of which was clear. This stock has been run through the planer and much of it shipped. The remainder is being loaded for consignment as rapidly as possible, with the result that it is out of the way, permitting extension of the docks. Two lines of dock rolls have been installed, which materially reduce trucking. The slab and waste conveyor has been overhauled and extended and other improvements are contemplated. The problem of logs has been settled by the closing of a deal for timber sufficient for three years. A deal is pending for other timber that would extend operations several years.

W. B. Patton, who has been identified with the Anderson & Middleton logging camp at Culp Creek for several years in the capacity of mechanical engineer, is for the time being at Swisshome, on the Siuslaw, driving a machine for a logging concern under the superintendency of "Curly" Grooms, another well known logger formerly of this section.

The O. P. & E. railway train brought up a string of flats yesterday from the spur at Teeters creek loaded with logging equipment which was taken out of the Culp Creek camp some days ago when the fire which started back of the cuttings threatened to get beyond control. The fire is now completely in check and no further danger is expected.

DISSTON WILLOWOOD.—Activity is apparent in the survey of the new road which will divert travel from the north side of Row river to the south side between Willowood and Disston. L. W. Hunt, road supervisor in charge, has his crew of six or seven busy blasting and digging out stumps in the right of way, which has already been slashed and burned. Yesterday a part of the crew was at work opposite the A. G. Suter ranch and the remainder of the gang were stump blowing just across the new bridge. It looks like an endless job, when one runs one's eye up the 60-foot right of way and attempts to verify Mr. Hunt's statement that there are a million stumps to be taken out. Wilbur Pitcher is on the job at the lower end with his big team taking the stumps out and hauling them to the stump piles as fast as they are loosened by the shots. The piles are made in the right of way and as soon as work is advanced beyond a setting the piles are fired, closely watched and burned to ashes. At this moment it is difficult to estimate the time that will be required to complete this 3 1/2 miles of new road, but to a casual observer it is highly probable that no "travel" will go over it until midsummer next year. While residents in this section were opposed to the change in route of the road, and filed a demurrer against it, they now seem to be reconciled to the decision of the powers that be and are "marking time," as one of these substantial citizens said to your representative, patiently awaiting the coming and the summing up of the expense account. It is understood that graveling and clearing two sections on this road is to be let by bids, one from Willowood falls to the Carter place, approximately half a mile, and the other opposite the Ray Gleason ranch.

Charles Pitcher, brother of Ben Pitcher of this section and of Miles Pitcher of Cottage Grove, is on the river on a visit from his home at Chilquin, Ore. Mr. Pitcher suffered a stroke some two years ago from which he is slowly recovering.

Mrs. Alex Lundberg, widow of the late Alex Lundberg of Disston, who now resides in Portland, is on the river looking after business interests, the guest of her daughter, Mrs. Wilbur Pitcher.

Your correspondent had the pleasure of a brief chat with Mrs. Ben Pitcher at the Pitcher ranch on Layng creek yesterday. Mrs. Pitcher is "general manager" of the ranch much of the time this season as Ben has been on the road job, and she is kept rather busy looking after her household duties, which are always first with her, then caring for the garden, the chickens, stock and an attractive flower garden. It is an attractive ranch, these 320 acres, just above the mouth of Layng creek, split by the road to Disston. There is a good barn, a remarkably roomy and clean barn lot, a well appointed six-room bungalow, with toilet and bath, running water, hot and cold, broad porches, climbing vines—in fact, practically every convenience and comfort. There is an acre filbert orchard now coming into bearing, also all sorts of

fruit, including large patches of strawberries. Another field of these berries is to be set out this fall. There are chicken houses and several hundred hens and pullets, representative of the several egg producing breeds. The fences are up and the stock kept from the well tilled fields of some 60 acres. This ranch was the original homestead of George Layng, who now resides on a larger farm at the forks of Mosby creek and Row river, and it was here that Mr. and Mrs. George Layng laid the foundation for a snug sum that went a long way toward the purchase of their present holdings, a part of which was the Dave Mosby ranch. The Layng creek ranch passed to the ownership of Dave Mosby who later transferred it to Ben Lurch, a pioneer merchant of Cottage Grove, and it was from Ben Lurch that the title passed to Ben Pitcher. This property consisted of 290 acres. Later Mr. Pitcher purchased a 40-acre tract adjoining, known as the J. Q. Dowd ranch, increasing the ranch to 330 acres.

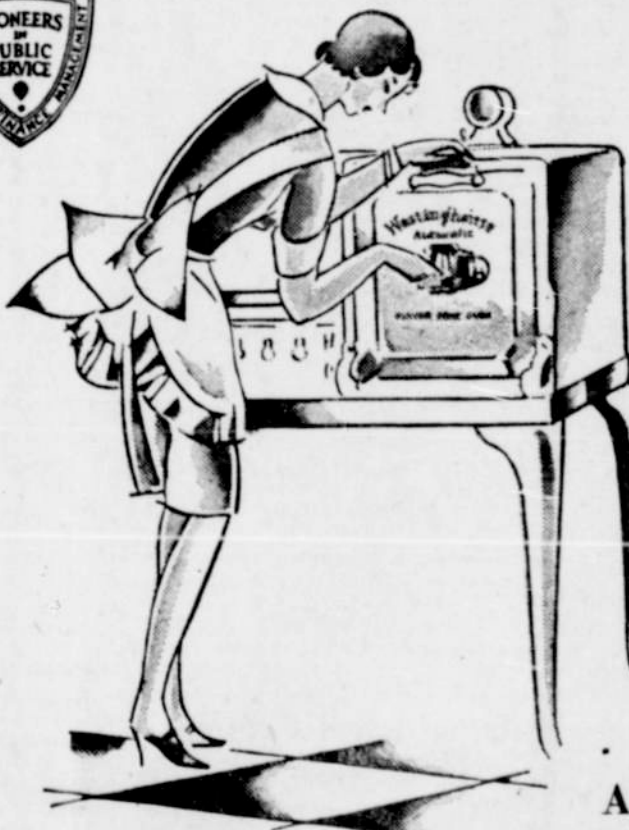
