USE OF WOOD FOR APPROACH URGED

Wooden Structure for Spring-
field Bridge to Solve De-
bate Over Fill.

Use of wood for construction of spans on the west approach to the Springfield bridge over the Willamette river would do away with the danger of floods created by construction of a fill and would be less expensive than concrete. Such is the contention of H. J. Cox of Springfield, secretary of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, who believes that use of wooden spans would solve the controversy between West Springfield people and the state highway commission over the proposed fill.

"I have seen several floods in West Springfield," Mr. Cox said, "and I know which way the water goes in time of freshet. A fill at the new highway bridge would turn the water down the highway. As concrete spans are considered too expensive for the approach, I can see no reason why wooden spans should not be put in."

Wooden spans, Mr. Cox believes, could be made to conform with the architectural design of the bridge and there is no doubt that a wooden approach could be built that would stand years of travel without bringing the first cost and the maintenance cost up to the cost of concrete spans. Durability under proper construction is unquestioned.

If a dirt fill is necessary at the Springfield bridge, why wasn't one put in at the Harrisburg bridge? That is one question Mr. Cox would like to have answered and another is why a wooden approach at the Springfield bridge would not be as acceptable as one to be put in by the county court on the bridge being built over the Coast fork of the Willamette river east of Creswell.

Here are some reasons listed by Mr. Cox for use of wood in the approach:

Use of wood would be economy. Consumption of a home product should be favored and an industry which pays not only a large part of the tax dollar but provides the income for thousands who help pay the tax dollar should be favored. Lane county has the largest stand of timber of any section of its size in the United States, and has the greatest number of sawmills in the Willamette valley.

Wooden bridges, such as the Cosburg and Hayden bridges, have served after the coming of automobile traffic for which they were not built. Twenty-five years hence present bridges may not be adequate.

Trestle parts and approaches could be built of wood even though the main spans must be of steel.
