ROW RIVER NEWS NOTES.

Oct. 23.—(Special.)—The infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Otis Dyer of Eugene, born early this week at the home of Mrs. Dyer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Pitcher, near Rajada, died October 24. The funeral was held today.

The Harms creek road is now receiving the attention of Roadmaster Teeters, with very noticeable improvement. Mr. Teeters' division extends from up the river near Star down to the city limits of Cottage Grove, between 10 and 12 miles of highway, besides several lateral roads. The Harms creek road is one of the roughest in this section and, while the patrons of the road are grateful for what the county court and the road supervisor have been able to do in the way of repairs, the fact remains that it is a poor road and reflects no credit upon a thrifty community nor the county. At the entrance of the Harms creek road into the Row river highway Supervisor Teeters has made a fine improvement in flaring the entrance and filling with clay and crushed rock over the culvert which he extended. Another improvement to his credit is the rim-rocking of the inside line of grade at the right angle turn near the O. P. & E. railway crossing a mile this side of Cottage Grove. The dip of this curve had been left low, with no wall support for the top dressing, with the result that, with the swing of cars taking the curve, the crushed rock was being continually pushed out of the road, making a reservoir for surface water in the winter time. A neat rock wall has been built which holds the crushed rock in place.
