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ADVICE ON MEASURES.

There are eight measures on the

November ballot, at least six of

which should be so severely swatted

that their sponsors will be dis-

courage from ever presenting them

again.

The first two are the Dunne bills

to decrease automobile license fees

and increase the gasoline tax. The

coming legislature is certain to

give serious consideration to license

fee reduction. The Sentinel be-

lieves there can be some reduction

without wrecking the road pro-

gram, but the Dunne bills are not

the way to do it. Vote 301 No and

303 No.

Next comes the grange income

tax bill. The Sentinel has fre-

quently expressed its opinions on

income tax. The measure proposed

has no offsets and does not pro-

vide that it shall be an additional

tax. It would add nothing to the

income of the state and its pur-

pose is frankly to reduce the prop-

erty tax. It offers nothing to

coax the vote of the person op-

posed to income tax, and nothing

to alienate the person believing in

income tax. It is a straight out

and out income tax. Those op-

posed to that kind of a tax should

vote against it. Those favoring

income tax should vote for it.

Next comes the proposal to limit

the powers of the legislature over

legislation enacted by the people.

This is dangerous proposed leg-

islation. Regardless of what jokers

might appear in a bill enacted by

the people, the legislature would

be powerless to correct them. The

legislature has never greatly abused

its powers and this inhibition

should not be placed against it.

Legislation enacted by the legis-

lature has been the subject of much

criticism. Legislation enacted by

the people does not have as much

serious consideration as that en-

acted by the legislature, therefore

mistakes in initiative legislation

are likely to be more numerous

than in that enacted by the legis-

lature. The people should not de-

prive themselves of the opportunity

to go to the legislature for correc-

tion of errors made in an initiated

measure. Vote 307 No.

The next four measures are those

that would close four principal

streams of the state. This is dan-

gerous proposed legislation and has

been illy considered. Oregon needs

industrial development. Oregon

cities need water from streams of

the state. It would be foolish to

close to industrial development four

of the streams most likely to fur-

nish power to industries, most like-

ly to be called upon to furnish wa-

ter for municipalities. Vote No on

all four.

The last measure on the ballot

is a four-mill levy on Lane county

property for the completion of the

McKenzie and Florence highways.

This levy was voted two years ago

by a large majority and defeated

by a legal technicality. It should

be again acted upon favorably.

Vote 316 Yes.

JUSTICE RAND.

Those who believe in fairness to a public official, those who would rebuke those who slander honest public officials, will cast a vote for Justice Rand, candidate for reelection to the supreme bench.

Justice Rand has been the victim of the most vituperative attack ever launched against a candidate for this position. It has been proved by a voluntary committee which investigated the charges against Justice Rand that they are entirely without foundation and are the child of the mind of one whom Justice Rand offended in honest judicial decisions. This investigation was made before the May primaries in which Justice Rand triumphed over his detractors. Nothing new has been added to the trumped-up charges and Rand should receive a tremendous vote of vindication in the general election.

KNOWLES FOR LEGISLATURE.

While The Sentinel is a so-called wide-bound republican newspaper, this writer intends to give a vote to George Knowles, candidate for the legislature on the democratic ticket. George is a resident of Cottage Grove and home pride and home loyalty should result in his getting a large complimentary vote from this section. He would make a good legislator and no republican need have any qualms of conscience about voting for him.

GOVERNMENT CONTROL.

Governor Smith, democratic candidate for the presidency, with his accustomed lack of judgment, recommends government control as a fit solution for the liquor problem and cites Canada as an outstanding example of the flourishing results of such a system. The writer has secured data on this "control" and the following are some of the findings:

The government is not controlling the amount of liquor drunk. Ontario is buying liquor at the rate of one million dollars a week. In Alberta four million gallons of liquor was sold in the second year of "control." Sales of beer increased in Quebec a million gallons over the preceding year. The seven provinces having "government control," with a population of ten million, spend \$160,000,000 a year for liquor.

The government is not controlling the sale of hard liquor. Since the opening of beer parlors the sale of hard liquors has increased 50 per cent. In Quebec alone the sale of hard liquor increased 32,275 gallons in one year. In Saskatchewan the sale of hard liquor has increased 33 per cent in two years.

The government does not control the number of persons drinking. Alberta issued 60,000 permits the first year of "control." Two years later she issued 144,000 permits. In Ontario 220,440 permits were issued the first four months. Drunkenness among women increased 53 per cent.

The government does not control drunkenness. If all the drunks were arrested there would be no room for them in the jails. Arrests for drunkenness increased 125 per cent in the first eight months of "control." All records for inebriates were broken at Toronto when 89 Labor day celebrants faced the magistrate.

The government does not control bootlegging. It is the argument of many that government control would do away with bootlegging. It does not work out that way. The Alberta liquor board recently said: "Our greatest problem is moonshine in the country districts."

Bootlegging increased 111 per cent in the first year. As much liquor is sold by bootleggers as is sold by the government stores.

Voters of Cottage Grove should beware and not be inveigled into supporting a system that is proving disastrous in the country to the north. Canadians are learning that instead of the government controlling liquor the liquor business is controlling the government.

Let us have no tampering with our great experiment. The eighteenth amendment is the most forward piece of legislation in all the files of time, shall we go backward a thousand years by adopting government control and a return of the saloons or shall we as a mighty nation keep our faces to the sunrise and go forward towards the horizon where the sky is rosy with the promise of a new day.

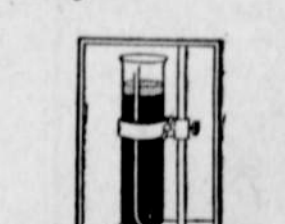
