CREATION OF A SUPER ROAD DISTRICT URGED

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30. — A petition for the creation of a super road district to be known as the Diamond lake-north Umpqua highway district, was received by the state highway commission here today at its regular meeting. The object of the district is to levy taxes for the construction of a road to Diamond lake up the north Umpqua river. A hearing will be held in Roseburg by the commission at a date to be fixed later and objections and arguments for the project will be heard.

Use Lumber Products Is Urged Upon Employees

Employees of the lumber industry should be among the first to insist upon wood being used wherever it can be used, in the opinion of George C. Pearson of Bend, general chairman of the 4-L employees wood promotion committee, who addressed mill men and employees here Tuesday night. Mr. Pearson pointed out the fallacy of lumber manufacturers and employees of lumber manufacturers building stucco houses and covering them with patent shingles. He cited instances in lumbering centers where this has been done.

Mr. Pearson is chairman of the only committee of employees ever organized for the purpose of promoting the business of their employers.

Wood promotion committees are being organized in lumbering sections of western Oregon. Earl Garoutte of the Bohemia Lumber company was appointed temporary chairman of a committee here and Cecil Caldwell of the W. A. Woodard company, temporary secretary.
