Waltz Shown to Be Akin to Wallowing

Harp of Ireland

The story is that "after Brian Boru was killed at the battle of Clontarf, this harp was given to Pope Alexander II. It remained in the Vatican for nearly 500 years, and was given, in 1521, to Henry VIII in recognition of his defense of the Seven Sacraments. Twenty years later Henry VIII gave the harp to the earl of Clanricarde, and it was handed down until it came into the possession of a Limerick antiquary. Archaeologists, however, say the harp is not older than the Fourteenth century.

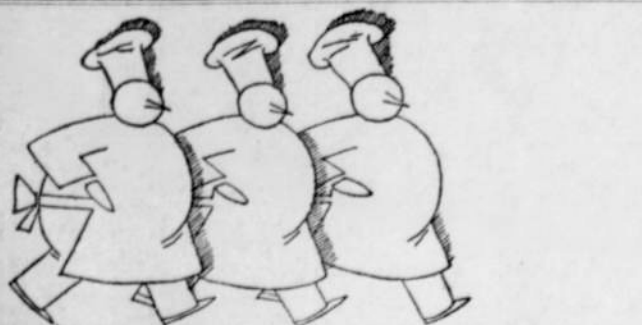
