LEGIONNAIRES HOLD DISTRICT MEETING HERE

Home Study Advertising Course for Merchants

Oregon State College to Furnish Lessons to Those Desiring Them.

A home study course in advertising copy and layout for Oregon merchants has been authorized by Oregon State college and is to be made available soon after November 1. It will be in personal charge of C. J. McIntosh, instructor in mechanics of advertising and writing advertising copy in the college major course of advertising and selling.

The course was first mentioned and requested by C. P. Haight, editor Blue Mountain Eagle, Canyon City, as a means of checking the drift of local trade from local stores to stores in nearby large towns and to city department and mail order stores. Mr. Haight called attention to the fact that many merchants without special study of advertising are thus compelled to compete unevenly with merchants who not only have highly trained advertising managers but also advertise largely with metropolitan newspapers that have large staffs of highly skilled advertisement writers and layout men.

This home study course is open to any one in Cottage Grove wishing it and application blanks may be secured of The Sentinel.

R. A. BOOTH HELPS GIVE ORGAN TO CANADIANS

Friendly relations between the United States and Canada have been more firmly cemented and the memory of American boys who sacrificed their lives in the world war under Canadian colors has been honored through the efforts of R. A. Booth, Eugene lumberman.

Last Sunday a grand organ, donated by citizens of the United States under the inspiration of Mr. Booth, was dedicated in the Canadian memorial chapel recently completed in Vancouver, B. C. The organ was presented by Mr. Booth and a number of other people who insisted on sharing in the gift in memory of the American men who voluntarily crossed the border during the early part of the war, enlisted in the Canadian expeditionary forces and gave their lives. It was also given as a symbol of that neighborliness and friendship which has existed between Canada and the United States for nearly a century and a quarter.
