Millions Dollars Spent In Protecting Forests

Four million dollars was invested by all agencies in protecting forests from fire within the 38 states cooperating with the federal government under the Clarke-McNary act of 1924, it is announced by the U. S. forest service in Portland, Ore. This is exclusive of the amounts spent by the forest service in the protection of the national forests, and is an increase of 20 per cent over the amount spent last year and nearly 40 per cent over 1926 expenditures.

The federal share has increased from \$600,000 in the fiscal year 1928 to \$1,200,000 for the fiscal year 1929.

Oregon received \$48,442 from the

federal appropriation for the fiscal year 1928, and an allotment of \$63,012 has been made for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1929.

Washington received \$50,955 for 1928 and has been allotted \$60,155 for the current fiscal year. These allotments to the states are paid into the state treasuries and are used by the state foresters as an aid in the protection of state-owned and privately-owned forest lands. Most of the money is allotted in turn to the forest protective associations, upon their agreement to provide adequate protection from fire, not only for their own lands but for all forest land within their cooperative units.

The federal appropriations are made in recognition of a certain public obligation to help protect cut-over and reforestation lands, and

enable owners to grow timber crops for the future use. The states are being urged to appropriate money on a similar basis to encourage growing new forests. Private owners maintain they need no financial assistance in the protection of their merchantable timber, but state and federal aid is needed to provide adequate protection to the large and increasing acreage of cut-over lands which will grow forests if protected from fire.
