SALVATION ARMY OUT OF COMMUNITY CHEST

Officers Say Amount Offered

Not Sufficient; Chest

Head Says It Is

As the culmination of a controversy between the Lane county unit of the Salvation Army and the local community chest in regard to the allotment of funds, the Salvation Army has withdrawn from the chest. There was difficulty over funds last year.

Captain H. C. Boyd of Eugene, in charge of the Lane county corps, issued the following statement: "The Salvation Army Lane county corps has withdrawn from the Cottage Grove community chest on account of a controversy over the amount allotted to the Salvation Army, the amount, \$50, being one-quarter of the amount needed and asked for. The army thought it necessary to withdraw and if necessary to conduct its own drive after the first of the year."

"The Salvation Army is a Lane county unit and the officers are just as much at the call of people of Cottage Grove as any other city of the county. Several cases have been cared for in the Portland White Shield home of the Salvation Army that have come from the locality of Cottage Grove and the financing of such cases should be done locally."

"It is expected that the people of Cottage Grove will arise to the issue and protect and support the interests of the Salvation Army."

Duncan P. Cameron, chairman of the community chest committee, on behalf of the committee issued the following statement: "The committee of the community chest wishes to take this opportunity of making clear to residents of Cottage Grove the situation that has developed between the chest and officers of the Salvation Army of Eugene."

"The chest committee, after careful deliberation and due regard to the good the Salvation Army is doing, felt justified in placing their

appropriation in the chest at \$50. This amount was offered with the understanding that the Army would not be called upon for any welfare or social work in our city, the \$50 being in the form of a gratuity. Last year the same amount was given and so far as is known no cent was spent in Cottage Grove nor was any asked for."

"There have been frequent references to some 'alleged' cases of girls from this community being taken to the rescue home at Portland, but no confirmation has come to hand."

"It is the position of the chest

committee that, if the Army withdraws from the chest and, refuses the amount offered, they should be refused solicitation of the city and if anyone is approached for a contribution he should refer such solicitation to the chest committee."

New Farm Relief Bill Ready.

Senator McNary is prepared to introduce a new farm relief measure at the short session of congress next month and thinks it can be passed before March, also that it is now shaped to meet the objection of President Coolidge. It pro-

vides for a federal board of 15 members to handle the marketing of surplus crops, the cost of such service to be paid by the government, the equalization fee having been abandoned. It is also announced that the tariff schedule will be amended so as to better protect farm products from foreign competition.

The Vote on Income Tax.

The grange income tax bill, which was defeated at the recent election, had a majority in 15 counties—Baker, Clackamas, Columbia, Hood River, Linn, Lane, Lincoln, Polk, Sherman, Union, Umatilla, Walla Walla, Wasco, Washington and Tazewell. Curry county is reported as a tie and the other 29 gave majorities against it, the total vote being 117,885 for and 130,713 against.

Leaving Multnomah county out, the bill received a majority in the rest of the state, 75, to 73,323 no.

Traveling over McKeon's has almost stopped for the time being. There is considerable snow and the use of chains is not even safe then. The vice stopped the first of the



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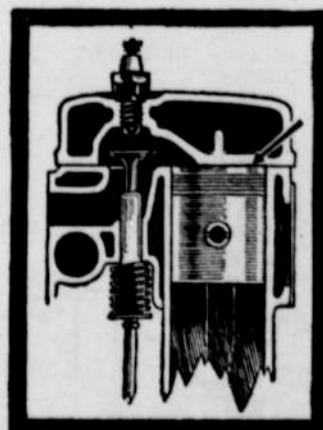
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
