MEMBER OF GROVE SEARCH PARTY FIRST AT SIDE OF LOST GIRL

Pay Wilbur Jokes About Marcel After Spending Two Nights in Siuslaw Wilds.

Two Hundred Join in Combining of Woods and Rescue of Eugene Miss.

Cottage Grove played a prominent part in rescuing Fay Wilbur, Eugene Guard stenographer, who was lost in the Siuslaw falls while from Sunday afternoon until found at 10:25 Tuesday forenoon by Harvey G. Ingram (Salem), member of the Cottage Grove party, who with his wife were visiting Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Bartlett. Mr. Ingram found tracks of the girl about three miles up Doe creek, about three miles from where the girl became lost and about two and a half miles from the Siuslaw road. He started calling and within a few moments heard the girl answer. As he approached her place of shelter under a fallen tree the girl, unable to stand, rolled out from her shelter and said, "Hello!" She was too weak to express the great joy she must have felt.

Ingram finds the girl, which one which he had provided for his own lunch in case he should not return to camp before night, gave her his coat and called for help in getting her out of the woods. George Bjorset of this city was one of the first to join Ingram and the two did a large part of the work in carrying the girl two and a half miles to the road.

Mitchell Carries News. Meanwhile Charles Mitchell of Loran made haste to carry word of the finding of the girl to the camp at Siuslaw falls, from which place word was rushed to the girl's mother at the J. W. King farm two miles away, where the base camp had been established. Joe Smith of this city piloted a car from the Siuslaw falls camp two miles farther down the slippery dangerous road to the Siuslaw falls where the girl was found. When they arrived there with the girl. They were worn out with their efforts, as was also Mitchell, who arrived at the Siuslaw falls camp dripping with perspiration.

Several other members of the Cottage Grove party must have been near the spot where the girl was found at the time she was found, but did not know that the search was at an end and continued clearing the woods for several hours. Two of them not reaching camp until 2 o'clock and not knowing until then that the girl had been found. There was some fear in camp that the last two to report in had become lost and two men had started out to find them.

How Girl Became Lost. The Wilbur girl, with a companion, Walter Wilbur, had visited Siuslaw falls Sunday afternoon and had gone back into the woods for a distance of about 200 yards, where Weber lay down for a nap. When he awakened 15 or 20 minutes later, Miss Wilbur had disappeared and he was unable to find her or get any answer to his calling or to several shots which he fired. After being found, Miss Wilbur explained that after tramping through the woods a distance she became exhausted, sat down and fell asleep. It probably was while she slept that Weber tried unsuccessfully to call her.

Spends Night in Rain. When she awakened she was unable to find her way out of the woods and when darkness came was unable to find a place for shelter. She thought there would be a better chance to find her if she remained in one place, so she sat on a log and spent the night in the open in a driving rain. She had no food or anything to eat, a fire and was thinly clad. The next day, Monday, she again tried to find a road or trail, but probably travelled through the woods parallel to the Siuslaw road. Near night she found shelter under the roots of a fallen tree. The next day she was unable to walk, but emerged from her shelter once in

While the girl was being carried out, she joked about the rain spitting her nose and wanted many shots of her rescuers. She said that she was afraid the first night and heard animals in the woods that probably were deer. Many deer were seen by the rescuing party.

Searchers Number 200. George Weber, the girl's companion, spent until midnight Sunday with residents of the Siuslaw county searching the woods with lanterns. Weber was also with the searchers Monday and Tuesday. Twenty-five members of the Ohsidians and American Legion post of Eugene joined the search Monday. When their efforts were of no avail, a general call was sent out Monday night and by daylight Tuesday there were 200 or more men who had braved the slippery mountain roads were on the ground. They were spread out along the road 75 feet apart as far as they could see. When the girl was found, she was lying on her back, her head and arms outstretched, and her legs bent at the knees. 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City Is Less Than Year In Arrears

The sound financial condition of the city is indicated by a call for warrants issued by the city treasurer. The call is for all warrants on the general fund up to January 5, 1928, all warrants on the street fund up to September 6, 1928, all warrants on the water fund up to May 19, 1928, and all warrants on the bond and warrant interest fund up to March 30, 1928. The general and street funds have been materially reduced during the past year by amounts put into the 1928 budget which have not been expended. The water fund is further behind than a year ago because of temporary improvements and repairs to the water system and because of installation of meters. However, all warrants on this fund outstanding were issued during the past seven months.

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Community Class to Be Biggest Thing in County

Non-Denominational Bible School Is to Hold Meetings at Arcade.

What has been spoken of by those promoting it as the biggest thing in the county is a non-denominational community men's Bible class which is to hold its first meeting at 9:45 Sunday forenoon in the Arcade theater. The men's class of the Christian church is the nucleus for the bigger movement, and during the past two weeks two teams have been combing the city for recruits not at all students at some Sunday school of the city. Rev. L. G. Shaw of the Christian church is to be the teacher. N. W. White and Bert Burrows are leaders of the team.

The class is exclusively for men and is to be conducted by men. All men are wanted except those who are in Bible classes of the churches of the city or who have official responsibilities in the Sunday schools of the city.

While women and children are not eligible to membership in this class, members will be urged to deliver members of their families to some Sunday school of the city before going to the class and to call for them after the class.

Members of the class will be divided into two sections, the red and the blue, and there will be at all times between the two sections a rivalry between the two colors.

Rev. Shaw, promoter of the class, has found it successful elsewhere and declares there are thousands of good fellows sold on the fundamentals of Christianity who are not members of any church nor workers in any Sunday school.

Attendance at the class will be credited to the various Sunday schools of the city as indicated by those attending. Collections will also go to the various Sunday schools, each contributor to indicate his choice.

The object of the class, as told by its promoter, is to foster harmony through community interest of members, to promote social fellowship and to keep before the world the claims of Cottage Grove as the home of big folk.

One of the three ideals which the movement is committed to is community advertisement. The soundness of this aim is evidenced, the promoter says, "by the fact that everyone wants his community well spoken of and that religious and secular people are hungry for news to tell the world. This class not only is here to make news, but news that will put Cottage Grove in the minds of the country through community happenings that we will be proud to have the world know."
