

Half U. O. Students Pay Half or More of Way

Half of the students at the University of Oregon are paying 50 per cent or more of their expenses, while only about 31 per cent admit that they depend almost entirely on their parents for support, according to figures on self-support just compiled by Richard L. Collins, university statistician.

Exactly 840 students, 646 men and 194 women, are 100 per cent self-supporting, a fact which proved

a surprise even to the statistician. The report shows that in all classes the tendency is for more men to be self-supporting than women, and also that the degree of self-support increases as the students advance through college. In the graduate school, 104 out of 129 are at least 50 per cent self-supporting.

There are 207 students who are entirely responsible for their own support in their first year of college, including 35 women. Out of 969 sophomores, 235, including 43 women, are 100 per cent self-supporting. One hundred eighteen juniors and 136 seniors are in the

column of complete self-sufficiency. Nine hundred twenty-one students, including 186 men and 743 women, admitted that they send home for nearly all of their money. This represents 30.88 per cent of the whole student body.

Early Pioneer Dies in Eugene. Mrs. Mary E. Driver, widow of Dr. I. D. Driver, pioneer Methodist minister of Oregon, died at 6 p. m. Saturday in Eugene. She was aged 77 years. Mary E. Williams was born in Illinois February 18, 1847, and came to Oregon with her parents when she was a year old, crossing the plains by ox team. She settled with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Smith Williams, in Linn county east of Albany. In 1872 she was married to Dr. Driver, who was at one time superintendent of

the southern Oregon district of the Methodist church. Surviving relatives are three daughters, five sons, two sisters, three brothers and nine grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Tuesday forenoon in Eugene and the body was sent to Salem for interment.
