Masonic History Of Old Days Recalled

Pioneer Masonic history was recalled by the initiation into the Eastern Star Friday evening of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Burkholder.

Mr. Burkholder's grandfather, J. C. Stouffer, was prominent in early Masonic affairs here and a charter member of both the Masonic lodge and Eastern Star chapter.

His widow, Mrs. Lydia Stouffer, is one of two living charter members of the chapter and the oldest living member of the lodge.

Her daughters, Mrs. Clara Burkholder and Mrs. Jennie Burkholder, became members of the lodge in 1887 and Mrs. Burkholder served several terms as matron.

She, Mrs. J. P. Graham, Mrs. Olivia Eskin, Miss Elsie Lea and Mrs. Minnie Willits are among the few living past matrons of early days.

Mrs. Burkholder also served as organist for two years and was district deputy grand matron for one year.

The local chapter is the fourth oldest in the state. When it was organized July 24, 1880, there was no grand chapter in the state and the charter came from Washington, D. C. A charter was issued by the grand chapter after it was organized several years later.

In the early days the chapter held its meetings in the Masonic hall located a short distance south of where the flour mill stands. It was erected by Mr. Stouffer. Mrs. Burkholder remembers that the lumber for the building was prepared in an improvised drying shed and that men watched the fire day and night. The building contained a dance hall downstairs. The Star had about 35 members.

Mrs. Burkholder's daughter, Miss Belle of Salem, is also a member of the local chapter. She is also a member of the White Shrine at Salem.
