New Born Babe Is Death Mystery

The body of a new-born infant found Saturday buried in a flimsy wooden box at the brink of the Willamette near Springfield was examined by the county coroner without results as to the child's identity or as to cause of death. Decomposition of the body, which had been buried for at least a month, prevented a reliable autopsy.

The discovery of the body was made by a man who is said to reside near the shallow grave in which the box was found. This man, whose name is not given by the county sheriff, reported that he had heard several voices near the grave one night over a month ago. It seemed to him to be some sort of drinking party. He investigated the following day and found fresh footprints. Thinking that this might be a hoard of liquor he uncovered a small box. He did not investigate the contents, desiring to watch the box for the return of the owners.

Saturday morning he decided to open the box. He found the body neatly covered with rags.

The sheriff's office was immediately notified and the body turned over to the coroner.

UNCLE SAM, PRINTER.

(Gresham Outlook.)

There is no reasonable ground for objection to the government doing business—printing, for instance—for itself when it is necessary and it can save money by so doing. But there is ground for objection when the government does printing for the public at a loss which has to be made up from government funds. It is a well known fact that the government sells printed stamped envelopes at a loss and carries on an unfair competition with printers in the matter.

It is estimated the postoffice department will show a deficit of \$100,000,000 for the present fiscal year. A contract has recently been awarded involving more than \$15,000,000 in connection with printing stamped envelopes.

"This means," says the Red Wing (Minnesota) Republican, "that one concern will have a monopoly of this amount of gross business, a large portion of which will be diverted from country publishers, who are practically the only

class of business men with whom the government competes in this manner.

"The injustice of this practice is all the more marked because the printing is done for an additional charge of only a few cents a thousand over the cost of the plain envelopes—a charge so small that it covers only a fraction of the cost. The envelopes alone are priced higher than necessary in order to cover a portion of the loss on the printing, but the customer thinks he is getting a bargain because of this juggling of price quotations.

"Having been victims of this unfair competition for half a century, it is little wonder that country editors are practically a unit in opposition to government opera-

tion of business enterprises. All fair-minded business men should assist the National Editorial association in its effort to eliminate this socialistic and un-American practice.

"There would be as much justification for the operation of retail stores by the government as there is for the retail sale of printed envelopes in competition with local printers."
