Commerce Boomed by Methods of Counting

For ages even the most intelligent men could count only to ten or twenty, the number of their fingers and toes. Then sticks and stone counters were laid in rows to indicate and compute numbers involved in barter and trade. In the earliest civilizations symbols were employed to some extent, then in Egypt they had the happy thought of drawing a picture to represent each quantity. Thus, a frog equaled 100,000 and a man with arms outstretched in admiration signified 100,000,000. The Greek and Roman systems of letters for numerals were considered a great advance, but only the most learned could do any adding or subtracting with them. The decimal system was brought by an ambassador from India into Europe in 723 A. D., and European countries got their numerals from Arabia in the twelfth century. It proved popular right away and teachers of the new system turned in great numbers to trade and industry, so long damned up by a lack of any simple method of keeping accounts or doing business with persons at a distance, sprung into life and the Commercial era was born.—Detroit News.
