GOVERNOR PATTERSON'S THRIFT PROCLAMATION.

January 17, 1929, will mark the two hundred twenty-third anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin, scientist, statesman, philosopher and apostle of thrift. No better tribute can be offered to his memory than the observance by the whole nation of a week dedicated to the policies which guided him in his personal achievements and his public service.

Thrift means far more than the mere saving or hoarding of money. It means a wise and constructive use of all possessions in order that they may eventually yield the largest and most desirable returns. In this nation where abundant natural resources and remarkable prosperity tempt us to grow prodigal, we need to take thought of the wisdom of personal and public thrift.

Now, therefore, I, L. L. Patterson, Governor of Oregon, do hereby proclaim the week beginning January 17, 1929, as "Thrift Week" and urge that during this period our schools, churches, and other civic and educational agencies give consideration to the importance of the wise husbandry of private possessions and the careful conservation of public resources.

Prohibition Praised At Victory Service

Rev. Morrow Declares Dry Law Task Not Completed; Facts Given.

That prohibition is not a completed task and that the forces of prohibition cannot rest on their oars but must continue the fight was the message of Rev. W. J. Morrow of the Methodist church, speaking at the victory service held last night at the Baptist church under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. and the ministerial association. He pointed out that the forces opposing prohibition are continually trying to take the teeth out of the eighteenth amendment, by repealing the Volstead act.

Rev. Morrow gave statistics showing that 290 bills are on file in congress providing that the Volstead act be modified. He said that each bill carries a joker to allow the evasion of the eighteenth amendment. One bill asks that 24 per cent by weight measure be allowed in place of the one-half of one per cent by volume in force now. The speaker showed that the 24 per cent by weight would equal 3 3/4 per cent by volume measure, the alcoholic content of the old saloon day intoxicating beer.

Conditions under a modified Volstead act would be worse than saloons, the speaker said, because any one would be allowed to sell the light wine and beers without license and there would be no safeguard for the youth of the country.

Rev. Morrow urged that the fight for prohibition go forward not only because in this automobile age the drunken driver would be a greater menace than a plague, not only because the thinking people of the nations of the world are looking with hopeful eyes on this country's prohibition accomplishment, but because prohibition has removed legalized temptation and thrown a bulwark around the youth of the nation.

Prohibition has been a success, a success and will continue to be a success, Rev. Morrow declared, and paid a tribute to the women of the nation for their fight in bringing prohibition. He showed that prohibition has brought about an increase in the wage scale, an increase in production, an increase in savings and bank clearings and has caused poverty to decrease and crimes bred by intoxication to decrease.

In conclusion the speaker urged that all unite to awaken the youth, who will be the voters of tomorrow, to the gravities of the fight and install in them an abhorrence of the old days of the saloons and intoxicating liquor.

Mrs. L. McAboy, president of the local W. C. T. U., pointed out that prohibition has not had a fair chance and that one can not expect to do everything in nine years. She said it takes a long time to clean a dirty house and how much longer a dirty nation. She expressed the thanks of the organization that prohibition had proved itself a success thus far.

Scripture readings were given by Rev. L. H. Randle, a prayer of thanksgiving was given by Rev. Duncan P. Cameron and a vocal duet was sung by Mrs. Baker and Mrs. Roy Leonard, accompanied by Mrs. Claude Sherman.
