Deforestation Problem Says Secretary Jardine

Cooperative Methods Bring Results; Drastic Action May Be Needed.

The grave consequences of continued deforestation make it imperative that the federal government, the states and the timber land owners join cooperatively in a more positive and aggressive effort to end the evils of forest devastation, according to a statement by Secretary of Agriculture Jardine, made in connection with comments on a pamphlet, "Deforested America," written by Maj. George P. Abern, formerly director of the Philippine bureau of forestry, and one of the earliest exponents of forestry in the United States.

The secretary's statement, as well as the Abern pamphlet, is of special interest in Oregon and Washington, whose extensive virgin forests have been called "the last great stand" of the nation's timber supply, also, because Washington has led the nation in lumber cut for many years, with Oregon in second place.

Pointing out the progress thus far made in the cooperative forestry movement, Secretary Jardine expresses the belief that cooperation between government and industry is applicable to the forest situation on a much larger scale than it has hitherto been applied, but stated that if the cooperative method proves inadequate, national security will require that it be supplemented or supplanted by more drastic measures.

Although expressing the view that the forest situation is far from satisfactory and that forest destruction is widespread, Secretary Jardine points to the progress made in forestry, especially under the cooperative forest fire control program of the federal government, the states and private landowners.

In this program both the states and many private landowners have worked loyally with the department of agriculture, said the secretary, and progress is being made by some of the more progressive landowners in the adoption of improved forest practices besides fire protection.

The department of agriculture is interested in the forest problem not only as a matter of timber supply, but as a matter of productive use of land," the statement continues. "One-fourth of our total land area is better suited physically and economically for forest production than for any other purpose, and the continued deterioration of this vast resource is adversely affecting agriculture as well as every other line of industry."

The secretary points out the large responsibilities with which his department is charged in the forest enterprise as a whole. It administers the national forests, participates in a large program of forest land purchase, is responsible for much research in forestry and forest utilization and administers the extensive Clarke-McNary program of cooperation in forest fire control and other phases of forestry with the states and private forest owners.

W. C. T. U. OPPOSES BILL PROVIDING 15 CRUISERS

At an institute of the W. C. T. U. of Lane county, held last week in Eugene, the union went on record as opposing the proposed construction of 15 cruisers and one aircraft carrier for the U. S. navy.

The institute was held primarily to celebrate the ninth anniversary of the eighteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States. The W. C. T. U. has been an ardent supporter of the Kellogg peace pact and in view of the fact that 61 of the 65 world governments have pledged themselves to vigorously outlaw war, the union entered strong protest against additional means of enlarging the war facilities of the navy.

The union leaders were instructed to write the congressman from this district asking him to exercise full strength to defeat the passage of such a bill.

Old Silk Stockings Make Beautiful Rugs

The average homemaker considers the warm appealing beauty of real old hand-made rugs a dream too costly for realization. Yet, with the expenditure of infinitely less time and patience than it cost to make the treasured heirlooms and antiques, she may have this luxury for her own home.

The great grandmothers of the present homemakers made hooked, woven, crocheted, braided and sewn rugs of many types—some of them very beautiful and very very homely. Their patterns were the family cat or dog, a flower motif or some more conventional design. Materials used were sometimes dyed especially for rug purposes, sometimes parts of old worn clothing, used without dyeing. But the colors were always bright, happy colors, designed to give the house an air of warmth and cheerfulness during the long, dreary winters.

Today the most popular of the hand-made rugs is made of worn silk stockings, either in their original colors or dyed for the development of definite design. Long, narrow continuous strips, made by cutting round the stocking in a circular fashion, are worked on a mat or background of heavy material or screen. The cross stitch is popular for this purpose as is also the needle point stitch, which gives practically the same finished effect and perhaps takes a little less material or screen. The materials, cut into narrow strips and used either dyed or plain, may be used to supplement the stocking supply.

Clever, original designs are sometimes worked out by home economists students at Oregon State Agricultural college with their study of color planning and design. Old patterns may be successfully copied, as many will tell their own stories of a period when grandmother used this medium for expressing beauty in floor coverings.
