Southern Pacific Buys Control Oregon Stages

The Southern Pacific Motor Transport corporation has acquired control of the Oregon Stages, Inc., and the Coast Auto Lines, Inc., as announced last week by L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific company.

Properties of the newly acquired stage lines will be operated independently except where coordination between these lines and the S. P. stages will help to improve service. The personnel organization of the companies will also continue as they are. Tickets of the acquired companies will soon be made interchangeable with those of the Southern Pacific Motor Transport corporation.

S. P. officials pointed out that the coordination of the new lines with the S. P. bus lines is a logical step in unifying routes and schedules so as to better serve the public.

It is said that the acquired control of the two companies is a step typical of the present trend in the development of motor transportation throughout the United States.

Two Oregon Students Have Thrilling Times

Shooting Rapids, Trapping in Snow, Catching Thieves
Some Experiences.

Trapping 40 miles up the McKenzie is eight inches of snow, shooting the wild McKenzie rapids in a rowboat and, like the North-west Mounted police, taking their men at the point of a gun for 12 miles through the timber and snow to compare footprints of trap and canoe thieves—such are a few of the experiences of Dick Horn and "Curly" Thomson, both students at the University of Oregon and members of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity.

The two boys go up the river every Sunday to their traps, making the trip up in a machine, which one brings back to Thomson's report and the trappers return to this place by shooting the rapids in a rowboat after their day's trapping. This return trip, according to Horn, is a thriller which can compete for excitement with almost any form of amusement, as the rapids are anything but smooth and only an expert with the boat can guide it through the rushing rapids.

One of the most exciting times in the trapping trips was when they discovered that eight of their traps and their canoe had been stolen. The thieves had left their tracks in the snow, however, and though the tracks were at least three days old they were still intact. The boys decided to play the role of the "Mounties" and get their men, so they jumped into their rowboat and started off down the river, searching both banks as they went along.

When they had traveled some distance they saw two men peering over the top of a big rock on the bank. They disappeared when the boys saw them. The boys rowed their boat to the bank and discovered their canoe pulled up on the bank. When accused of stealing the canoe the men said that they had found the canoe in the brush on the other bank and had merely rowed over. When the boys insisted that the canoe had been stolen by the men they started to get insolent so "Curly" reached for his gun, and Horn took the men's guns away from them.

Then came the exciting time of the affair. After a fistie battle in which the men were thoroughly cowed the boys forced them at gunpoint to walk back 12 miles through the snow and timber to compare their boot tracks with the ones left in the snow. When they arrived the tracks fitted perfectly, even to the length of the caulk on the shoes, and when the men saw that the evidence was against them they admitted the theft and gave the boys their traps and canoe.

The culprits were released after they had promised to leave the property of the trappers alone and not charge them for the canoe.

The two young men have been trapping up the McKenzie all of this school year, going up every Sunday, and some very valuable skins of all kinds have been the rewards of their labor. One of the best prizes was a large bear skin which the boys brought back to Eugene with them.—Eugene Guard.
