## Lane County Suitable For Alfalfa Growing

## County Agent Fletcher Gives Statistics on Growth of This Crop.

Convincing proof that parts of Lane county are well adapted to the growth of alfalfa was given in a talk by County Agent O. S. Fletcher at the Tuesday luncheon of the chamber of commerce. The speaker made it clear that certain soil requirements are necessary for a successful growth and where the land was not overly fertile and well drained it was best to seed to other crops.

In the ten years since alfalfa was first grown in Lane, as more or less of an experiment, interest has steadily increased. Farmers, especially dairymen and poultry raisers, realize its great value as a livestock food. Tests in all parts of the county have shown its superiority over all other hay as a milk producer and poultryman find it is the best crop that can be grown to provide green feed for hens.

The Eugene Farmers' creamery has been instrumental in creating interest among the farm operators and with the assistance of the county agent, has furnished first quality seed to the growers for cost by means of pooling. Since 1925 Mr. Fletcher has pooled orders starting with 1400 pounds for 82 purchasers. In 1929 orders were placed by 68 farmers for 1650 pounds. A total for the five years was 405 purchasers for 13,199 pounds. During this same period the sales of seed dealers have consistently increased.

Farmers who have grown alfalfa crops for a period of years are convinced it can be grown here successfully. It is estimated that 1200 acres are under cultivation at present in Lane county, said the speaker. The yield per acre averages four tons but many farmers report six tons.

Mr. Fletcher in giving directions to those interested advised taking a year to prepare the seed bed before sowing. The seed should be planted in the spring as the best time for sowing alfalfa, the best results being obtained from crops sown the middle of May. Land should be treated with hard plaster before sowing and evenly planting and acid soil should be well limed. Seed should be properly inoculated before sowing.

The county agent stated that alfalfa is being successfully grown in many communities tributary to

Cottage Grove and he is sure there is much land within a ten-mile radius of this city, where a good yield would be realized.

Fifteen farmers from this vicinity were guests at the meeting. P. W. Collins of the Cottage Grove Laundry and Jack Lawton of the Bangs Garage were received as members into the chamber of commerce. This makes a total of six new members since the first of the year.
