Arthur's "Round Table"

The table which is now called "The Round Table of King Arthur" is to be seen in the Great hall at Winchester, England, part of the old castle there. At the west end of this hall, above the remains of the royal dais, hangs this table, 17 feet in diameter. The thirteenth century and is possibly older, and was repainted in the reign of Henry VIII. Of course there is no way of tracing any connection of King Arthur and his knights with this table. This table is divided into 24 places for the king and 23 of his knights. According to legends, there were 13 seats around the table, but according to another there were 30 seats and the total number of knights of King Arthur was 140.

INCREASE IN STUDENT LOAD FAR AHEAD OF INCOME FROM STATE FOR UNIVERSITY

Portland, Or.—Amazement that the University of Oregon could still function efficiently on an income that has fallen far short of the rapidly increasing enrollment was shown here recently when a group of alumni and friends of the institution were shown figures and charts showing the relation of income to expense.

Since 1920, when the millage tax went into effect, the student load (equivalent full-time enrollment) has increased 83.4, while the income from millage has increased only 12.1 percent. For the present year the student load is expected to reach an increase of 94 percent, while the income will be but 13.5 percent.

"Only the utmost attention to details and most efficient administration could be responsible for the present sound condition of the university under such a handicap," one alumnus declared. "People of the state, however, cannot expect this condition to continue indefinitely, and in the very near future either the quality of instruction must drop, or some means devised to keep many deserving young men and women from attending the institution."

The chart below graphically illustrates the difference in growth in enrollment and income:

Note: The student load (equivalent full-time enrollment) was computed as follows: the total credit hours in extension and correspondence were divided by forty-five to arrive at the full-time equivalent for this division. This is based on the assumption that a regular student remains for three terms and carries a normal load of 15 hours. The summer sessions are six weeks, and therefore one summer school student was counted as one-sixth of a full-time regular student. To these equivalents were added the enrollment at the Eugene regular sessions.

HIGHER EDUCATION COST INCREASE LOW

Figures Show University at Eugene Causes But 4 of Tax Jump.

Portland, Or.—Higher education in the state of Oregon has caused but 1.7 percent of the tax increase in the state since 1920, and the University of Oregon itself has caused but 4 percent increase, it has been revealed here, following a statistical study made by experts upon the request of alumni and friends of institutions. Those making the survey found that roads and highways had occasioned the heaviest increase, being responsible for 57.7. The investigators pointed out that even though this road program had cost considerable money, the state has reaped great benefit from it.

Similar benefit to the state would accrue from investing more in higher education, it is declared by many increasing enrollment in institutions of higher learning, without corresponding increase in revenue has worked a hardship on them, and unless this is corrected it is likely that many boys and girls of Oregon will be denied educational training that a progressive state should give them.

The table below shows graphically how small the proportionate increase in cost of higher educational institutions has been:
