PRODUCTION CONTROL LUMBERMEN'S PLEA

Legislative Assistance Called
Necessary to Reforesta-
tion Plans.

SEATTLE, WASH., Feb. 7.—Legislative assistance in controlling timber production as a necessary step in industrial reforestation and perpetual timber production has been asked for in a letter directed by Wilson Compton, secretary of the National Lumber Manufacturers association, to President Coolidge, President-elect Hoover, cabinet members and members of the present and next congress, according to word received by the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

In taking this action, the organized lumber industry has fallen into step with the oil and coal industries, which, through their respective representative organizations, are calling attention to the public interest in the basic commodities on which these industries are based and are seeking legislation from the federal and state governments, permitting control of production.

The resolutions adopted by the board of directors of the national association, referring to the proposals for controlled production of oil and coal as meritorious, explain that whereas neither oil nor coal once removed can be replaced, the timber supply can be made perpetual through reforestation, and that the American people are entitled to assurance of such perpetual supply. Because of the overproduction and consequent low prices of standing timber, resulting, it is implied, from inability to regulate production under the law, present governmental policy contributes to deforestation.

The resolutions point out that the United States government is the largest individual owner of standing timber; that low prices, resulting from overproduction, reduce the returns which the government could obtain from its forests; that reforestation can be accomplished only through the leadership of the federal government and the cooperation of state governments, and that controlled production is desirable to that end.

Equalization Board Change Is Proposed

Senator Bell's Bill Would Re-
move Assessor, Clerk
As Members.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Feb. 5.—Ben Keeney, "political maverick" of Lane county, was the subject of discussion on the floor of the senate Thursday when Senator Bell's bill No. 46, which proposes to take the assessor and county clerk off the board of equalization and make the county judge and county commissioners the board of equalization. The bill survived a severe gas attack and escaped from the barbed wire and barbed tongue entanglements of the narrow margin of two votes, the vote being 17 to 15, with 16 required for passing.

Senator Bell explained that he held nothing personal against the assessor of his county and that he was even trying to raise the assessor's salary despite the fact that a piece of property owned by Bell is assessed at \$6,000 while a similar piece of property that cost more but is owned by another is assessed at \$1,000.

Senator Bailey based his opposition on what he believed to be the complete removal of the assessor from having a say in hearings on claims for readjustment of assessments. He did not object seriously, he said, to the assessor being taken from the board, but he believed the officer making the assessment should have the opportunity to defend his own work.

The bill is likely to draw a heavy barrage when it attempts to pass the senate's hand of final passage in the lower house.

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTS HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER

Snow Helps Farmers.
Lane county farmers are not discouraged over recent weather conditions. "This snow is just what we need for a protection for young clover. The snowfall has done no damage and is a great help just now," said O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent. Although there had been many trees in the orchards it was not believed to be heavy enough to break down any of the trees. Some of the smaller limbs have been broken, due to the excess weight of ice, but this is doing no particular permanent harm to the trees, the county agent said.

Round the Circle

Feb. 7. (Special).—The heavy snow which prevailed throughout this section for two weeks is now a thing of the past, the fall on the lower and intermediate elevations having all but disappeared. During the storm there was speculation as to prospective high water in the river and tributaries, but a cold rain set in which cut the snow so slowly that only moderately swollen streams are in evidence.

Wayne Kirk is busy these days building additional rabbit hutches as his fine strain of Chinchillas is now rapidly on the increase. The rabbit industry was taken up by Mr. Kirk only a few months ago and his original stock was two does and a buck. At this writing he has 30 with a near future promise of many more. In preparation for his stock, Mr. Kirk has adopted the single-hutch plan as against the double-hutch plan under one roof with a working aisle between the two rows of hutches. In the single-hutch system a row of hutches is built facing the south with an overhanging roof of elevation sufficient to let the morning sun well into the hutches. As stock in creases, another row of hutches is built at a distance of 15 or 20 feet, again facing the south without interference with sunlight and the best of ventilation for the first row. Mr. Kirk is of the opinion that the business may be made very profitable as the market is not saturated and the rabbit pelts range in price from \$1 to \$1.50.

On East creek, a misnomer for Harris creek, which took name in honor of one of this section's early settlers, "Uncle John" Harris, a horse tragedy was all but enacted a few days ago. Elmer Wicks, who was off work at the J. H. Chambers & Son logging camp on account of the snow shutdown, started to build a new bridge across the creek, building lots being on the west side. In placing the new stringers for the bridge, one of his father's (John Wicks) horses was pressed into service. In crossing the stream for another stringer, the animal either slipped or stumbled on a rock and fell head down the stream. The water was not very deep but swift and many binders were in the channel. The horse failed to regain his footing but in his struggle neared the bank, where Elmer managed to lay a line to him, holding the horse from a further wash down stream into a deep hole just below; but Mr. Wicks couldn't get the horse back to his feet again. "Twins" that his knowledge of logging came into good play, when he threw out a "luff" line. Wicks is a strong boy but even with a "luff" his strength failed to bring the animal to the bank against the horse's struggles and a swift current. Just about the time he was ready to give up the struggle and "Old Dobbin" was beginning to stretch out and stiffen with the chill of winter waters, three neighbors dropped down off the road and gave a hand. With a few heaves, steady by jerks, the animal was pulled ashore all in and almost ready for burial service. A fire was built, feed secured and a mighty vigorous rubdown was administered. It took sometime and a lot of work to bring the old horse "out of it" for he was badly bruised and he had been fighting for his life for better than an hour in the chill waters. Hard work and determination was rewarded by return of bodily warmth and life and now the faithful is in a stall nursing many bad bruises.

County Road Work Starts.
Machines used for county road maintenance were put to work Monday, according to the report of County Commissioner Clinton Hurd. The recent rains and snow has put the roads in fine condition for working and the crew is busy filling ruts and pot holes with fresh gravel.

LOCAL SCHOOLS START HEALTH CAMPAIGN WORK

Farmers' Week Planned For February 18 to 22

County Agricultural Council
Cooperates With O. A. C.
on Meetings.

A special "farmers' week" will be conducted in Lane county February 18 to 22 by the Lane County Agricultural council, cooperating with the extension service of the Oregon Agricultural college. The week will be made up of a series of special days, each day really being a one-day farmers' institute, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agent. All meetings will be held in Eugene.

The schedule for the week is as follows: Monday, February 18, livestock day; Tuesday, February 19, horticulture day; Wednesday, February 20, farm crops day; Thursday, February 21, dairy day; Friday, February 22, poultry day. The executive committee of the county agricultural council will have general supervision of the conference. The Lane County Horticultural society will be in charge of the program on horticulture, the Lane County Dairyman's association will be in charge on dairy day, the 4-H Club Poultry association will be in charge on poultry day and special committees appointed by the agricultural council will be in charge on livestock day and crops day. On each day there will be talks on production problems and a discussion of the general economic outlook for the crop or commodity under consideration by specialists from the Oregon Agricultural college. The officers of the county agricultural council and the county agent hope to make this series of meetings one of the most successful ever held in Lane county.

Plans Under Way For Industrial Exhibition

American Legion Will Sponsor
Second Annual Showing
March 28, 29, 30.

Plans are being formulated for the second annual industrial exhibition, sponsored by the American Legion, to be held March 28, 29, 30. The general committee in charge of arrangements is A. C. Bagley, C. S. Hall, Carl Peterson and Phillip Bukowski. The location of the exhibition will be announced later.

The exhibition will be run on practically the same plan as that of last year, with possibly additional attractions. All floor space will be sold to various merchants and business and industrial concerns of the city and community for displays. Fred Bennett is in charge of the school exhibits, which will include work from different departments and grades of Cottage Grove schools and neighboring districts. The committee is hoping to arrange for larger quarters than were available last year and not only increase the number of display booths but also have a "Days of '49" in connection with it.

Mrs. Bliss arrived here Tuesday from Minnesota and made arrangements for the funeral.

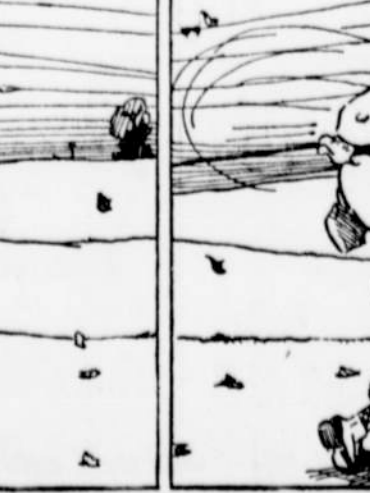
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Brigadier General Praises Battery

Battery "E," local national guard unit, ranked fourth highest in the state in drill attendance last year with an average of 88.7 per cent.

The following letter of commendation was received by Captain C. C. Cruse from George A. White, brigadier general commanding the 82d infantry brigade: "I observe that during the year 1928 battery 'E' of your command obtained an average drill attendance of 88.7, the fourth highest in the state. 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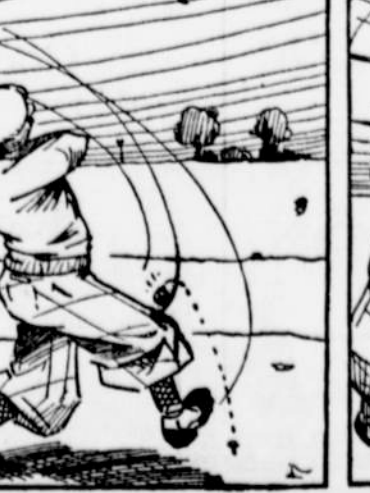
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Telephone Service To Give Time

The old time courtesy extended patrons of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, that of giving the correct time of day, which has been restored. J. L. Chamber Head Praises Stand on Timber Deals

Ashland Proposes Fairer Cut
of Returns From Gov-
ernment Sales.

President C. E. Stewart, at the Tuesday noon luncheon of the chamber of commerce Tuesday, gave a talk commending Ashland on the stand taken opposing the present policy of the government in the system of handling the sale of timber in Oregon. Oregon is one of 11 states wherein the federal government takes 60 per cent of the income received from the timber sales for its own use, while practically all the remaining sum is used in paying expenses of the sale. If a balance remains it goes to the state. However this is a small per cent of the total proceeds, Mr. Stewart pointed out. It is the hope of the Ashland chamber, with the aid of the other organizations in the state, to obtain some congressional action whereby the state will come in for a fair share of these returns. A committee composed of Joe Smith, Sam Mackin, Charles Stevens and P. E. Mendenhall was named to attend a meeting tonight in Roseburg for the purpose of obtaining fairer freight rates for this part of the state. R. L. Stewart was appointed to represent the organization in sponsoring a series of lectures for community benefit. It was decided to discontinue the forum luncheon the first Tuesday of each month and on that day have a 6:30 dinner followed by the regular monthly meeting.

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LUMBERING OPERATIONS RESUME AFTER LAYOFF

Lumber operations, which were more or less at a stand still during the past ten days due to the cold weather and snow, have been resumed. The logging camps of the W. A. Woodward Lumber company resumed work Friday after a few days' shutdown. The mill did not close because a supply of logs was on hand at the time. The Bohemia Lumber company has reopened both its mill and camps and J. H. Chambers & Son have their road crew back on the job after a lay-off from repair work on the logging road.

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A. & M. OPERATIONS RESUME IN MARCH

Lumber Company Will Reopen
Culp Creek Camp and
Latham Mill.

The Anderson & Middleton Lumber company, one of the largest operators in this district, will resume operations at its Culp Creek logging camp and Latham mill between March 1 and 15, it was recently announced by officers of the company. The logging camps have been down for a year but the mill was in operation part of the time.

The company has extensive holdings up Culp Creek in addition to holdings up Teeters creek, where a mammoth dam and storage pond were recently completed. A recent news dispatch from Salem created considerable interest in lumbering circles with the announcement that Anderson & Middleton would soon start building a 150,000-foot capacity mill at Fir Crest up Teeters creek. The local office has been besieged by letters, telegrams, long distance and personal applications by those desiring jobs or contracts. While the company is planning a new mill, no definite announcement has been made and plans will not be completed for some time yet.

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
