Building Regulations Revision Considered

Herbert W. Lombard, city attorney, and L. W. Coiner, city engineer, were appointed, at the Monday night meeting of the city council, to act with the fire and building regulations committee in endeavoring to revise the present building code.

An ordinance regulating the construction and specifications of canopies and marquees was passed. It provides that the height above the street be at least nine feet six inches and that the canopy be of steel, cast iron or glass construction.

A sidewalk ordinance was passed authorizing the construction of a sidewalk on the east side of south Seventh street between Washington and Adams and one on south Washington between Seventh and Eighth.

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White Shadows Filmed On Island of Tahiti

Studio, Laboratories, Projection Room Constructed for Production.

Five thousand miles from the home studio at Hollywood, "White Shadows in the South Seas," which will be shown at the Arcade Tuesday and Wednesday, February 12 and 13, was photographed and

film developed, printed and projected in what is considered the world's queerest motion picture studio.

The studio was built amidst towering palms by the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer expedition entirely with native labor and was located within 50 feet of the shores of the south sea on the island of Tahiti.

Because of the immense distance from their base, the studios were forced to be virtually self-contained. The unit constructed under the direction of W. S. Van Dyke consisted of laboratories, a projection room, a commissary, executive offices and living quarters for the entire party of 60 people.

Some difficulty was found in getting natives to work but this was largely overcome by catering to their love of luxury in the food line. A can of American salmon and a loaf of baker's bread was found to work wonders.

Five months after the studio was placed in operation, the picture was finished and Van Dyke, Blue Raquel Torres, Robert Anderson and the other members of the company started the trip back to civilization leaving a wrecking crew behind them.

Today all that is left of the world's queerest movie studio is a small heap of wreckage under the swaying palm trees. The "movies" have long gone but the memories with them a permanent record of one of the most interesting spots in the world.
