## History of Coast Fork Local Told by Paper

Farmers' Union News Carries Story of Early Struggles of Group.

The following account of Coast Fork local was carried in the January issue of the Farmers' Union News, official organ of Farmers' union, district of Oregon and southern Idaho:

Coast Fork local holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. The second meeting is a social, open meeting to which the community is invited. These meetings are varied—some are purely educational when speakers present topics of current interest and other times the evening is given over to social affairs entirely. This arrangement has proved popular and productive of good attendance.

In December the annual election resulted in only minor changes in the official staff. O. A. Nichols is again president; Hugh Trunnell, vice president; John Kebebeck, secretary; Fred Fuhrer, conductor; Jesse Culver, doorkeeper; L. D. Huff, director; W. T. Jones, chaplain. Mrs. George Kebebeck, Myrtle Dobberstein and W. S. Averill will serve on the executive board.

Coast Fork has been one of the surprise locals of the state. It was organized by H. C. Jackson on May 18, 1923. Mr. Jackson, himself, is given to recounting his experience there. One afternoon he called at several homes and arranged an evening meeting at the school house to which several farmers came and the meeting was so more or less successful than an average gathering. Some 11 men signed for a local and a new date set for the following week.

George Kebebeck was appointed temporary chairman and Mrs. George Kappauf temporary secretary. Imagine Mr. Jackson's surprise when on the appointed evening the school house would not hold all the farmers who came to hear of Farmers union. At the close of the talk 103 members were added to the membership roll. What Mr. Jackson did not know was that President Kebebeck had donned his Sunday clothes, stepped into his Ford and canvassed the length of the river asking his neighbors to come and hear Farmers' union talked. Mr. Kebebeck served as chairman for two years and proved to be a strong, efficient leader.

The local soon outgrew the school house and moved to the church, which was a larger building. When after a time it became evident that the hall was not big enough for the activities was needed it was Bob Powell, who was then vice president, who instigated activities that resulted in the building of one of the finest Farmers' union homes in Lane county. The materials for the hall were purchased but the labor was donated. The cedar "shakes" for the roof were borrowed from a member and many days were spent dressing and preparing them. Members loaned money and took notes and many methods were resorted to to earn money for payments, all the way from food sales to fair exhibits.

In some cases notes were cancelled in lieu of labor and 1928 found this local the possessor of a home on it was the local's game.

The building period carried Coast fork over the critical period in a local's life and subsequent activities have left little time or inclination for any great loss in membership. The community is not especially thickly settled and while the majority of the members reside within six or eight miles there are some very faithful attendants who drive 12 and 15 miles.

Coast Fork is one of the heaviest contributors to the financing of the Lane County Farmers' Union warehouse. Members were more or less responsible for the establishment of a branch warehouse in Cottage Grove which handles flour, feeds, groceries, eggs and poultry and is under the management of V. J. Gillespie, a member of the local. Three members of Coast Fork served on the warehouse board in 1928.

Other than the foregoing the aforementioned local is just like any other organized body; it makes mistakes, has its ups and downs, its difficulties to iron out, its depressions to overcome and its pride of prosperity to sustain.
