Tourist Travel Gives Boost to Communities

Visitors' Money Has Greater Stimulus for Business, Says S. P. Manager.

New and dynamic dollars flow to the tills of businessmen who support community advertising, according to S. P. McGinnis, passenger traffic manager for Southern Pacific, who says that tourist travel contributes much to the prosperity of the west.

"The dollar spent by the tourist," McGinnis said, "is a most dynamic dollar. Quickly passing in circulation, it has a greater stimulus for business than the home town dollar which has been traveling the round of the city's cash registers and purses for a period of years."

"Recently to show the work a dollar does, a new greenback was put into circulation attached to which was a note asking each spender to record thereon the transaction in which it played a part. The result showed that in 14 days the dollar changed hands 27 times, five times each for salary, tobacco, cigarettes; three times for candy; two each for laundry, soap, and once each for automobile accessories, bacon, garters and toothpaste."

"When the tourist puts a dollar into circulation it is a new dollar, an addition to the community's ready cash, and of benefit to every business through which it passes. For this reason the tourist leaves permanent benefit in every community he visits."

"Southern Pacific is doing much to advertise the communities it serves. Each year we spend approximately \$1,200,000 in advertising the regions served by our lines and the fine modern transportation service which carries tourists to these regions."

"The community which backs up this advertising with its own well-planned advertising of local scenic and recreational attractions is bound to profit as a result."

PAUL GORDON MEMBER OF O. A. C. RIFLE TEAM

OREGON STATE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, MARCH 7.—Paul Gordon of Cottage Grove, sophomore in commerce at the college, scored 374 as a member of the Oregon State rifle team which fired the highest total score ever made in the history of the team by shooting 3749.

Shooting with determined effort to finish the season with a defeat, the rifle team competed with Cornell university, Emory university, University of Kentucky, Massachusetts Agricultural college, Iowa State college and Lafayette college.

"Exceptional ability was shown by all members of the team in their standing (offhand) firing," said Captain H. L. Barrett, range officer. "The team has been on a gradual climb to the goal set at 3750, as shown by the scores made in the past four weeks of firing: first week of competition, 3661; second, 3702; third, 3721, and fourth 3749."

Lane Is Second in Number Granges

The new roster of grange of officers for the state, as compiled and distributed by Miss Bertha J. Beck, Albany, state secretary, discloses the fact that Lane county is second in the number of prosperous working granges in the state. Clackamas leads with 19 and Lane is second with 18. There are 249 granges in the state. Harney county is the only one not having granges.

Bounty Reports Made. February proved a good month for hunters and trappers but a hard one for predatory animals in Lane county, according to bounty records compiled by the county clerk's office. The records show that bounties were paid on 75 bobcats, 17 coyotes and 8 cougars.

Insurance Can Be Reinstated. Extension of time has been made by the United States veterans' bureau in which world war veterans may reinstate or convert their service insurance policies, according to announcement at the office of the Lane county chapter of the American Red Cross. Veterans who desire assistance in making application will be aided by the Red Cross office.

Traffic Fines Are Paid. Traffic fines were paid as follows in police court during the past week: Harry Williams, \$2 for parking in a restricted zone; Charles Bach, \$2 for failing to stop at a stop sign; Willard Carpenter, \$2 for failing to stop at a stop sign.

Elbert Bode, reading clerk of the house of representatives for 12 years, was the speaker at the Lions club luncheon this noon and told of some of the things that happened at the recent session.
