Teachers of the Cottage Grove schools and those of surrounding districts will gather at the high school Saturday for local teachers' institute. Superintendent D. A. Emerson of the local schools will preside.

At the forenoon session E. J. Moore, county superintendent, will tell of the changes in school laws and courses of study. Prof. Thos. H. Gentile of U. of O. will give a demonstration in fifth grade geography teaching and Arnold D. Collier will tell of county club work.

In the afternoon there will be departmental work for the high school and grades and talks by Superintendent G. E. Finnerty of Albany, Prof. C. E. Rothwell of the University high school in Eugene and Dr. Harold S. Tuttle of University of Oregon.

One hundred and thirty-three knights and women of the Ku Klux Klan and their friends gathered in L. O. F. hall Monday night for a program. Judge John A. Jeffrey of Portland and Mrs. J. A. Dads and Kids Talk
Value of Citizenship

Class representatives and class "dads" spoke at the Friday assembly of the high school on the meaning of the citizenship contest being conducted in the school and the value of such a contest.

Kenneth Williams, freshman representative, said that the school should, by wholehearted cooperation, show its appreciation to the business men whose donation of a cup made the contest possible.

Ray Heck, youngest "dad" to the youngest class, spoke on honor as something that can be sold but cannot be bought. He said that honor should be developed in the classroom, as it is one of the greatest assets a student can have when he steps out into life.

The junior representative, Albert Williams, showed that school is a business whose main function is that of a filling station to supply the gas that will carry students on the highways of life. Miss Williams pointed out that even though the student has been supplied with training in school he must have destination and purpose to get him anywhere.

C. E. Brown, junior "dad," stressed that application, concentration, cooperation and observation are four needed factors in school work and that the student who has learned these four habits has a far greater chance for success than the one who has not.

Genevieve Meranda of the seniors spoke on "What Is a Good Citizen?" pointing out that the good citizen is not one who is not of the larger objective, that of working for the best interests of the school as a unit. She said that there should be rivalry in the contest but that it should be friendly and clean.

Worth Harvey, senior "dad," showed the relationship between school and city. He pointed out the responsibility a student should feel toward the school because of its value and cost of operation. He gave statistics to show that a person with education has more chance at greater earning power than an untrained person.

The sophomore representative, George Kibelbeck, said that to get the greatest good from the citizenship contest every member in each school should give cooperation so that the class projects will be completed and the goal of the contest attained.

Loren Harvey, sophomore class "dad," spoke on man power, comparing the possibilities in the student body in its numbers to the results of the 12 who years ago spread the teachings of Christianity which now cover the world. He also pointed out that the cooperation of man power of the student body will help to form a habit which will be of tremendous value in later life.
