'Round the Circle

(By JACK HOWARD.)

Under "Lane County Names," a Eugene paper a few days ago made brief mention of Adams mountain. The very brevity of the paragraph offers an excuse for the following reference; and this with neither geographic nor autobiographic data in immediate reach:

Adams mountain is one of the conspicuous landmarks of the east and gold bearing quartz standing sentinel in the long valley with Bohemia, Fairview, Grouse and Grizzly mountains over the hidden wealth of Bohemia mining district 28 miles south of Cottage Grove, in direct line north of Black Butte, and is the crowning peak of the lower divide between Sharps creek and Champion creek. This rugged heap of God's creative material takes name in honor of O. P. Adams, one of Cottage Grove's pioneers, who long since wandered from the trail of the prospector into that other trail that leads after in search of the hidden beauties of eternity. It was on the slope of this mountain peak that the tireless old prospector picked up the tracings of a vein of gold producing one day in the long ago and where he located The Quartz mine. It was this location that he did assessment work and no small amount of development for many years, going in the spring and coming out in the fall, year after year, until one day Father Time, whispering in the old gold hunter's ear, told of the easy grade on that other trail as compared to the steep climb and frowning ruggedness of Adams mountain—and he listened.

The writer recalls him as an interesting, companionable and genial gentleman, with abiding faith in Oregon, of which he had better than a passing knowledge. In reviewing the affairs of the district one day, Mr. Adams said to the writer: "I do not expect to live to verify my words to you today, but it is possible that you may, and I want to tell you now (and the old man reached over, by way of emphasis and gripped the corner of the old news desk) that some day the Bohemia mining district will rank among the best producers of base metals in the United States; and some day The Quartz will be mined for good returns in pay dirt."

Again referring to "Lane County Names," in which Culp Creek is mentioned, a slight error appears, not grievous but possibly of technical concern, in which the town is located on Culp Creek. As a matter of fact, Culp Creek, the post office, officially written as two capitalized words in the U. S. post office department records, is not on Culp Creek, which empties into Row river from the south better than 100 yards above Culp Creek, the postoffice, which is located on the north bank of Row river. Culp Creek, the stream, was named for John Culp, who, some 25 or 30 years ago, located a homestead at this point, where he and his family made their home for a number of years. Mrs. Culp (Minnie Hawley) was a daughter of one of the first old settlers of Row river country, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Hawley, who buffeted the hardships of pioneer days on their ranch about a mile below the present town of Culp Creek. John Culp was well known not only in the Row river section, but in Cottage Grove, where for many years he worked as a barber. It is believed that he died in Seattle several years ago.

When a petition for a postoffice was presented to the United States postal department in 1925, in compliance with departmental requirements two names were suggested: "Culp Creek," and "Unit," the latter being the name of a new logging machine shortly before put in to commission by the Anderson & Middleton Lumber company in the timberlands in the Culp Creek canyon. The department chose "Culp Creek."

The town of Culp Creek was made a familiar name to readers of Oregon newspapers, particularly those of Lane county, the last year through the medium of the Boston-Kenton company, which staged the major stirring military scenes of the picture play, "The General," at that point. Thousands came to Culp Creek for the scene in which an engine dropped through a burning bridge.

Old friends and true, living over and over early friendship days of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Jennings of Dorena, Ore., and Clel Williams of Deer Lodge, Mont., was the stage setting at the Jennings home this week. Time has slipped swiftly by since, many years ago, Mr. and Mrs. Jennings, then comparatively young, with a little cluster of happy children, removed from Montana and cast their lot on the picturesque banks of the McKenzie river near the thriving little town of Walthersville. It is now some 18 years since the Jennings family removed from the McKenzie to the Row river country, settling on a comfortable ranch within a mile from Dorena. In all this time since Charley Jennings and the good wife fled from the rigors of Montana climate to become fixed residents of Oregon and to champion its sunshine and rain not for one moment has the friendship for Clel Williams been allowed to ebb. Mr. and Mrs. Jennings, following influenza, have had to be careful about getting out in the weather and this week's visit with their old Montana friend, who is on a vacation from his duties as guard in the Montana penitentiary, has turned the clock of time back at least 10 years for the three concerned.

Snow in Bohemia Is 20 Feet Deep

The heaviest snow that can be remembered by old time miners fell in the Bohemia mining district during the past winter, according to those who have visited the district. On the saddle between Bohemia and Fairview, where there is no chance for a drift, trees 25 feet in height are completely hidden except for a few feet of the tops. The snow at that point is at least 20 feet deep. It is much deeper at points where it had a chance to drift.

The following rules and regulations relative to election of teachers have been adopted by the school board:

1. That a definite salary schedule, providing for a minimum and a maximum salary with increase depending upon training, experience and quality of services rendered, be adopted as soon as financial conditions will permit.

2. That in the employment of new teachers, it is not to be the policy of the board to employ married women.

3. That only college or university graduates be employed in the high school, and that only normal school graduates or those who have completed the equivalent of a two years' normal course be employed in the grades.

4. That after the second year of teaching, no teacher be given an increase in salary unless he or she has completed at least four credit hours of summer school work during the preceding year in an accredited institution of higher learning.
