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## THE PEOPLE AND INCOME TAX.

An item in a news letter sent out from the state market master's office contains the following:

"Some of the newspapers are blaming the legislature for passing an income tax measure in face of the fact that the people of the state several times defeated such laws. Oregon history tells us that women's suffrage was defeated several times; so was prohibition, so was the repeal of the anti-negro clause of the state constitution. The people have since decided that they had been guided by false prejudice in each of these cases. Is not a similar conclusion on the income tax possible?"

The Sentinel has in the past complimented Market Master Seymour Jones, and may do so again in the future, but it does not appear exactly proper for a news letter from his office to contain propaganda for income tax or any other controversial political or economic subject not peculiarly the province of the farmer, which income tax is not.

Aside from the impropriety, if such it be, of publishing propaganda in his news letter, State Master Jones' argument is sound in part only. It is true that the people changed their minds about prohibition, about women's suffrage, and about other things, but it is equally true that in each and every instance which Market Master Jones mentions they expressed their change of opinion through the ballot. In the case of income tax, as passed by the recent legislature, the people were given income tax without having opportunity to say whether they have changed their minds. In fact, the state Market Master Jones must know, income tax was not referred for the very reason that it was feared the people had not changed their minds.

If Market Master Jones was present when the question of referring income tax to the people was under consideration, he will recollect that those who in the past have raised the rafters shouting about the intelligence of voters in general and demanding that they be given an opportunity to speak, voted against taking a chance on referring income tax to that same intelligent electorate, while those who in the past have been bemoaning legislators who hadn't the backbone to pass a law without regard to the wishes of the rabble, made themselves hoarse demanding that in this instance the people be given a chance to speak.

They also believed the people would again defeat the tax. The Sentinel believes that the attitude toward income tax is changing, and that some day in the not distant future most of the states of the union will have income tax, but it very much doubts whether there is a majority to support the present income tax, which is certain to have the referendum invoked against it.

The Sentinel believes the electorate would act favorably upon income tax with some kind of property tax offset. It also believes the electorate would at this time vote an income tax that would be used to take up the state deficit. The Sentinel supported such a tax two years ago.

Also the excise and intangibles taxes are forms of income tax. These two seem certain to become law. Those who will come under these taxes may be expected to feel like imposing income tax on others, but a strong little against income tax seems likely, and income tax isn't likely to be acted upon favorably unless its proponents put on a real campaign.

The revered and senior editor of the Sentinel will readily understand that the taxpayers of the state have some natural curiosity to know what was included in the embracing "etc."—Portland Spectator.

So far as The Sentinel is concerned the dear taxpayers will not remain in ignorance of what was included in the "etc." which has caused the Spectator so much concern. However, it makes us most unhappy to have to cause the Spectator grief by informing it that the "etc." were not more inebriating than an alleged humorous paragraph in the Spectator's favorite daily.

day's issue of the Oregon Voter there has been discussion of tax matters and there will be discussion so long as taxes are levied. Our duty is to study calmly and to write about it, but let us do so sanely, reasonably, temperately. For the most part the taxes the people pay are for the purposes we have endorsed and they have approved. Is the money being spent wisely and economically? Is the desired purpose being achieved? Are we getting value? Are just contributions being made by all? These are tax subjects we can write about without sinking into a sea of pessimism over Oregon. Let us make that our effort instead of criticism and complaint.

I might go on. I might recall for those of you who have forgotten the splendid health record made by the young men of Oregon who were examined in the draft in the case of diseases that are somewhat under the control of the individual and whose absence is an indication of a good standard of individual conduct. Oregon stood very high. The young men of Oregon were eighth in the nation in their freedom from social disease. Whatever you may think about taxes, or poverty or California, I say that this record alone is enough to justify such pride in Oregon as will overcome her feeling of inferiority.

I might urge a change from the acceptance of defeatism because great enterprises and great growth are not chronicled for Oregon every day. Let us remember that size and bigness are not tremendously important. Of quality of achievement, of citizenship and of progress Oregon need not be ashamed.

I might present other facts and other ideas, but here are enough. Oregon is fortunate and wealthy and great, great in history, in resources, in citizenship, in accomplishment and in promise. Pioneers endured extreme hardship to reach Oregon, to subdue its wilds and to establish their homes. Like them we have chosen it for our home because it promises most to us. We can develop a forward looking and cohesive spirit if we will learn all that is good in Oregon, tell of it, preach it, write about it and take pride in it.
